

A NORTHERN PACIFIC LAND RING.

The Resignation of Assistant General Manager Odell the First Step in the Way of Reforms to be Inaugurated by the Villard Party.

St. Paul, October 14.—From a private letter from New York it is learned that Assistant General Manager Odell's resignation from the Northern Pacific is the first gun in the campaign of radical changes planned by the Villard party.

Negotiations for the consolidation of the Northern Pacific and Wisconsin Central railways are now in rapid progress, and a through line from Chicago to the Pacific will soon be arranged.

Lamar Soon to Resign.

Washington, October 12.—A friend of Secretary Lamar believes that he will not wait, as has been thought probable, until the meeting of congress before resigning to take his seat on the supreme bench.

Verdict in the Kouts Disaster.

Valparaiso, Ind., October 14.—The verdict of the coroner's inquest at the Kouts disaster is made public to-day. He says: "The accident was the result of the negligence of the train dispatcher, in permitting the passenger train to attempt to run with a disabled engine, knowing that a fast freight was but a few miles behind it, and by the negligence or carelessness of Engineer Dorsey, of the freight, running his engine at a high rate of speed through a fog, knowing a passenger train was but a short distance in advance with a disabled engine."

W. A. Clark vs. The Miner Pub. Co.

Helena, October 20.—In district court of Butte W. A. Clark has been given judgment against the Miner Publishing Co., for \$18,703.39 and cost.

St. Paul, October 18.—Mr. Buckley has decided not to accept the position of assistant general manager of the eastern division of the Northern Pacific, made vacant by the resignation of Odell.

Root, superintendent of the Montana division and branches, will succeed Ainslie, and M. L. Vining, superintendent of the Fergus Falls and Black Hills division, succeeds Root.

A Suit for Libel.

Butte, October 18.—The suit of Nettie Rae et al. against the Miner Publishing Co. for \$20,000 damages for libel commenced to-day in the district court.

Thomas Ryan, in Roane county, and the lynching of Roberts, mentioned in the dispatches, it has been learned that an organized band of regulators, numbering over 1,000 and including farmers and other residents of Jackson, Roane, Kanawha, Clay and Gilmer counties, has existed for six months.

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
