Senate Bill No. 12. "An Act for the submission to the qualified electors of the State of Montana of an amendment to Section 9 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Montana relating to revenue and taxation."

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Montana be amended, and that the question of such amendment be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Montana at the next general election.

Section 2. That Section 9 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Montana be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The rates of taxation on real and personal property for state purposes, except as herein provided, shall never exceed two and one-half mills on each dollar of valuation; and whenever the taxable property of the state shall amount to Six Hundred Million Dollars (\$600,000,000) the rate shall never exceed two and one-half mills on each dollar of valuation, unless the proposition to increase such rate, specifying the rate proposed and the time during which the rate shall be levied shall have been submitted to the people at the general election and shall have received a majority of all votes cast for and against it at such election. Provided, that in addition to the levy for state purposes above provided for, a special levy in addition may be made on live stock for the purpose of paying bonds and interest on the same for stock inspection, protection and indemnity purposes, as may be prescribed by law, and such special levy shall be levied annually in amount not exceeding four mills on the dollar by the State Board of Equalization, as may be provided by law."

Section 3. Separate official ballots shall be used at the general election to be held in November, 1910, which shall have printed thereon the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution relating to revenue and taxation."

Section 4. All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This Act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval. Approved February 5, 1909. UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, State of Montana, ss. I, A. N.
