

USE AND CARE OF FARM SHOP TOOLS

Country Boy Should Be Able to Do Repair Work.

MAKEUP OF NECESSARY OUTFIT

The increased use of machinery in farm operations has made it necessary for the farmer to make repairs and attachments that will prolong the life or add to the effectiveness of his equipment.

It pays to buy tools of good quality. In most cases their usefulness and length of life are determined by the material used in making them.

Oil should be used on many of the bright tools to prevent rusting. It is important to keep all edge tools sharp that the work may be accomplished with ease and accuracy.

Vessel for Curing Meat.

CO-OPERATION BRINGS RESULTS

The Turtle River Township Farmers' Club, which centers around Bass Lake, is to be congratulated. This club, which was organized last August by the local agriculturist, certainly has a corps of officers and members who are in for doing things.

A telephone was needed to connect the widely isolated houses, so a meeting was recently held and forty-two shares were sold so that now the telephone which will connect them with the outside world is a certainty.

Meanwhile they have been thinking more seriously about hastening the land clearing process and getting a few more acres under cultivation each year. At a recent meeting 100 pounds of alfalfa seed was ordered to meet the combined needs of some of the members.

This is only one of the active clubs in Beltrami county, but after seeing what it is helping to bring about there can be no doubt left in the mind of the most skeptical as to the value of organizing these clubs.

ROTATION VS. DISEASE.

Pests Accumulate Rapidly Under the One-Crop System.

The accumulation of noxious weeds, diseases and insects on the farm is one of the most serious sources of loss. This results as a rule from the constant growth or too long continued culture of the same crop or class of crops on the same land.

Each tool should have its place and should be returned to it when a job is finished. A good way to insure the return of tools is to draw an outline of them on the wall, then paint in the space with black paint.

MONTANA BRIEFLETS.

SHORT ITEMS OF NEWS FROM ALL OVER THE STATE

What Has Happened in Montana During the Past Few Days

Helena, July 2.—John M. Boardman, formerly of this city, today tendered his resignation to Governor Stewart as state senator from Dawson county.

Helena, July 2.—Martin Mulvahill, one of the best known mining men in this section, was found dead in his room in this city tonight, with a bullet hole in his right temple.

Forsyth, July 2.—The petition for the creation of Russell county from Rosebud, Dawson, Yellowstone, Ferris and Musselshell counties was dismissed by the county board upon request of the petitioners.

Helena, July 2.—The Great Northern Railway company and the Henningsen Produce company of Butte were among the defendants indicted by the federal grand jury when it made its final report to Judge Bourquin.

Billings, July 7.—The \$10,000 open air natatorium built by the city of Billings, was open Saturday to the public, after being under construction since last fall.

Helena, July 8.—Nearly 15,000 head of cattle were shipped into Montana last month, according to the record of importations kept by State Veterinarian W. J. Butler.

Great Falls, July 8.—The city is to have a very modern market building to cost \$44,000, to be ready by Nov. 1 next.

Helena, July 8.—A jury in the federal court brought in a verdict of not guilty in the case of the United States against W. G. Lake, charged with introducing liquor on the Fort Peck reservation.

Helena, July 8.—J. H. Gardner got a verdict for \$3,000 against the Mountain States Telephone company in the district court this afternoon.

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Great Falls, July 8.—Placing his head upon the rails between the wheel of a Great Northern switch engine in the west side yards, John Dawson, 22, a laborer, made an ineffectual attempt to end his life last night.
