CAR JUMPS THE TRACK.

One Man Killed and Several Other Persons Injured.

St. Louis, June 8.—One man was killed, three persons were fatally injured, and two score of others were more or less seriously hurt when a suburban street car bound for this city from Greve Coeur lake jumped the track and pitched ten feet over an embankment. The car was running at a high rate of speed when it struck a sharp curve.

The accident occurred two blocks west of the city limits.

The car was filled with passengers, half of them women and children, returning from the picnic at the lake. Many women were taken from the wreckage, unconscious and bleeding. One child's throat was cut from ear to ear, supposedly by flying glass.

Seven Terrorists Hanged.

St. Petersburg, March 2.—The seven terrorists, including three women, who were condemned to death by a court-martial for complicity in a plot against the lives of Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasavitch and M. Chtcheglovitoff, minister of justice, were hanged at Lisay Noss, opposite Kronstadt.

A "Merry Widow" House.

Merriam, Kan., is to have a "Merry Widow" house. Jim Campbell, proprietor of the general store at Merriam, is preparing to build a house of nature stone which is to cost \$3,000. "We call it a 'Merry Widow' house," said Mr. Campbell, "because the eaves will project beyond the walls such an unusual distance that in appearance it will resemble these 'Merry Widow' hats that the girls are wearing."

Coal Gas Substitute.

Dannert gas is the name given in Germany to a new substitute for coal gas. It is made from oil and coke, and, while not unlike water gas, it is much cheaper to produce.

Convicts For Outdoor Art Work.

Two hundred convicts will be employed in building the north and south state road near Oklahoma City, Okla., in which unusual attention will be paid to secure artistic landscape effects. The road will run along the Arkansas river and other streams, with particular attention to securing good views. Along the foot of the creek and Cherokee hills curves will be laid out for the purpose of showing the natural beauty of the country.
