**The School.**

Sentiment in Harlowton is Practically unanimous that a new substantial school should be built and made ready for occupation for the opening of the school year beginning in September, 1909. The members of the school board have had the matter under consideration for some time. Now the Commercial club has given the project a new impetus by appointing a committee to draw up a resolution to be presented to the school board, and to incorporate in this resolution suggestions as to the character of the building, the manner of financing the project and recommending that the matter of bonding the district be submitted to a vote as soon as possible. With the school board and the business men back of the project, there is now no doubt but that a good substantial school will be erected here during the coming summer.

Can any person estimate the advantages to be gained by having a splendid school in the town? Is it possible to do anything at the present time that will bring more direct benefits and results than the erection of a school that will afford the educational advantages which rightfully belong to a thrifty people? The eastern investor, accustomed to the advantages afforded by good schools, churches and hospitals, in looking over the town naturally asks: "Where is your school? Have you any churches?" We give our lame answer. His inevitable conclusion is to move on to towns that have these advantages. If we expect men with families, and they are the kind we want to locate here, we must give them to believe that their children can enjoy such educational facilities as are enjoyed by other towns of equal population. A good school in Harlowton would enhance the value of property to an extent that alone would warrant the expenditure.

The most economical kind of education for children is that given, when the children can live at home. The safest kind of education from the moral standpoint is that given when the boy or girl is under the watchful eye of the parent. Why should people in this vicinity be compelled to send their children to Helena and Bozeman for better schooling? They are not to be censured for resorting to this practice now. It seems necessary under the circumstances if the parents are to give their children a proper education. It is a singular fact too that many children yet in the grades leave here every winter for the educational centers. We must erect a school building with such modern equipment, as will induce parents to send their children here. Keep the children and the money that would otherwise be expended at home.

Plans are underway to build such a school as will afford facilities for carrying on high school work. If these plans are consummated, there surely will be no further need for sending school children away until they are prepared for collegiate work or else the parents desire that they attend some religious school. Let us prepare for future growth. Let us build wisely and well. Let us begin an educational center in Harlowton, such as will excite the admiration of neighboring towns.

The Emperor William has secluded himself a good deal since the criticism so unsparingly made upon him for his indiscreet utterances on international affairs. It is now stated that he intends to strike back at the German papers that have criticized him. He had better leave well enough alone. The hearty reception accorded him on his birthday shows that his popularity was returning and criticisms have ceased. It is always well not to disturb sleeping dogs, but the press will certainly be awakened again if he throws sticks at it.

An unexpected and by no means desirable fate seems to be threatening the "Garden Cities" started in England within the last few years. Faddists of all kinds appear to be making their home in them. Letchworth, one of the prettiest of these cities, is said to be over run with suffragists, anti-suffragists, anti-tobaccoists, anti-vaccinationists, anti-vivisectionists, socialists, vegetarians, fruitarians, and a host of others, so that there is a monotony in life where such conditions prevail.

The wasteful manner in which this country is using up its natural resources is on a par with the action of the business man who each year makes a serious invasion upon his capital. The result is disastrous in either case.

In Russia the government chief of police is accused of being a revolutionary spy, and the latter of the revolutionary party is accused of being in the pay of the government. What a delightful country it must be to live in.

Domestic troubles would be fewer and sooner overcome if they were not told to neighbors, nothing is more disastrous to the home life than telling every grievance to others.

San Francisco will soon win back her old supremacy as the country's storm center of murder mysteries.


**Hears Dying Father's Voice in Dream.**
