





SUGGESTIONS ON DRY FARMING

Alfred Atkinson of the Montana Experiment Station Names Proper Crops to Grow.

Dry farming differs from humid or irrigation farming in that the supply of moisture is not so abundant. Dry farming practices must therefore be designed to conserve the moisture both by proper cultivation and the use of drought resistance crops.

Experience and experimentation indicate that breaking can best be done during the months of April, May and June. At this time the ground plows easily and the succulent grass decomposes rapidly when turned under. While there are wide differences of opinion regarding the best depth to break, good results have usually been obtained by breaking as deep as possible. This will vary in different soils, but breaking from three to six inches deep is considered safe.

As soon as the land has been broken or plowed in the spring it ought to be thoroughly disked. This will compact the furrow slice and loosen up the surface into a soil covered mulch. The importance of this cannot be over emphasized. Land plowed during the day ought to be thoroughly disked before leaving the field in the evening. This may seem unnecessary but it is very important.

On land that was plowed during the season of 1908 thorough surface cultivation ought to be given as soon as the soil becomes dry enough, even though we may not intend to seed for some time, it is essential that we cultivate the soil thoroughly so as to prevent the escape of the moisture that needs to be held if the crop is to be carried through the dry weather at ripening time.

Among the spring crops that have done well on the dry farm are macaroni wheat, hullless barley, spring rye, early maturing oats and flax may be mentioned. Hullless barley is one of the safest. Flax is adapted for growth on land freshly broken but is not superior to hullless barley. Macaroni wheat, Turkey red fall wheat and fall rye are very profitable dry land crops.

As to the time of seeding spring sown crops ought to be planted as soon as the soil is in condition. Fall crops have done well when seeded from August 15 to October 15, but we regard the latter part of August as the safest and would recommend this.

Light seeding ought to be practiced. From 3 pecks to one bushel of seed is ample with most of the crops. Heavy seeding is adapted for hay production, but is not wisest when grain is desired.

Grain ought not to be planted broadcast. Use a good press drill and plant the seed well down into the moist soil. We must remember that successful dry farming means successful moisture conservation, so we must maintain a loose soil mulch on the surface of the fields whenever possible.
