

### ORDINANCE NO. 22.

An ordinance relating to concealed weapons and providing penalty for carrying same.

Be it ordained by the board of aldermen of the town of Harlowton.

Sec. 1. No person in the town of Harlowton shall wear under his or her clothes or concealed on or about their person, any pistol or revolver, except by special permission from the Mayor; nor shall any person wear under his or her clothes or concealed on or about their person, any sling-shot, cross knuckles of lead, brass or other metal, or any bowie-knife, razor, billy, dirk, dirk-knife or dagger, or any knife resembling a bowie-knife, or any other dangerous or deadly weapon. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed one hundred dollars, provided however, that this ordinance shall not be so construed as to prevent any United States, State, County or town officer, or any member of the town government from carrying such weapons as may be necessary in the discharge of his duties.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage and approval.

### ORDINANCE NO. 23.

An ordinance repeating and amending certain parts of ordinance No. 4 as hereafter described.

Be it ordained by the board of aldermen of the town of Harlowton.

Sec. 1. Art. 1. That art. 6, sec. 2, be amended to read two dollars and fifty cents per quarter instead of five dollars per quarter.

Art. 2. That art. 8, sec. 2, be made to read, each bus, hack or cab, two dollars and fifty cents per quarter.

Art. 3. That the word "used" in art. 14, of sec. 2 be struck out.

Art. 4. That art. 16, sec. 2 is hereby repealed.

Art. 5. That art. 17, sec. 2 be amended to include Bowling Alleys

and that the license for same shall be two dollars and fifty cents per quarter for each alley.

Art. 6. That art. 22, sec. 2 be amended to read five dollars per annum.

Art. 7. That art. 26, sec. 2 shall be amended as follows: "Those whose goods are not taxed in Meagher County shall be deemed a traveling merchant."

Art. 8. That articles 1, 2 and 3 of sec. 3 are hereby repealed and the following rate be charged for license.

(a) Those whose sales are twelve thousand dollars per month; or over shall constitute a business of the first class and shall pay a license therefor of twenty dollars per quarter.

(b) Those whose sales are ten thousand and under twelve thousand dollars per month shall constitute a business of the second class and shall pay a license therefor of fifteen dollars per quarter.

(c) Those whose sales are eight thousand and under ten thousand dollars per month shall constitute a business of the third class and shall pay therefore a license of twelve dollars per quarter.

(d) Those whose sales are six thousand and under eight thousand dollars per month shall constitute a business of the fourth class and shall pay a license therefor of ten dollars per quarter.

(e) Those whose sales are four thousand and under six thousand dollars per month shall constitute a business of the fifth class and shall pay a license therefor of seven dollars per quarter.

(f) Those whose sales are two thousand and under four thousand dollars per month shall constitute a business of the sixth class and shall pay a license therefor of five dollars per quarter.

(g) Those whose sales are under two thousand dollars per month shall constitute a business of the seventh class and shall pay a license therefor of three dollars per quarter.

Art. 9. That art. No. 2 and 3 of sec. 4 are hereby repealed, and article 10 of this ordinance be inserted instead.

Art. 10. That all opera houses shall pay a license of two dollars per quarter and all rooms or buildings used for any exhibition, entertainment, show, moving picture, theatrical or other like entertainment shall be deemed an opera house and pay license as provided in this article.

Sec. 2. That the town treasurer must make diligent inquiry as to all persons in this town who are liable to pay license as provided in this ordinance and must require, where the rate of license is divided into classes, each person to state under oath or affirmation the probable amount of business which he or the firm of which he is agent or attorney, or the association of which he is president, secretary or other officer, or managing agent, will do in the next month or the next three months as the treasurer may direct.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance to be in full force and effect on and after its passage and approval.

### ORDINANCE NO. 24.

An ordinance to prevent the spread of contagious and infectious diseases.

Be it ordained by the town Council of town of Harlowton.

Sec. 1. All physicians and surgeons shall report in writing to the Health Officer, within twenty four hours, all cases of contagious or infectious diseases which they shall attend. Any householder in whose dwelling there shall occur a case of cholera, small-pox, typhus fever, cerebro-spinal fever, yellow fever, relapsing fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, measles, typhoid fever, whooping cough and chicken-pox, or any other infectious disease, shall immediately notify the health officer of the same, and, until instructions are received from the health officer, shall not permit clothing, or other property, that may have been exposed to infection to be removed from the house.

Nor shall any occupant of the premises where such disease occurred change his residence elsewhere without the consent of said health officer. And it shall be the duty of all physicians and attendants to avoid exposure to the public of any garments or clothing, about their own persons, that may have been infected from exposure to any disease.

Nor shall any person, by any exposure of any exposure of any individual sick with any contagious disease, or of the body of such person, or by any negligent act, connected therewith or in respect of the care or custody thereof, or by needless exposure of himself, cause, contribute to, or promote, the spread of disease from any such person or from any dead body.

And it shall be the duty of the Board of Health to order such separation and isolation, or domestic quarantine of the sick, from other persons not necessary as attendants, and also such special care and disinfection as shall be needed in order to prevent the spreading of such disease to others.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of section one of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, and cost of prosecution.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall go into effect upon its passage.
