HAMMOND SEEK'S CABINET PLACE

Mining Engineer Would Head Commerce and Labor Department.

Washington.—Friends of John Hays Hammond, the millionaire mining engineer and publicist of Massachusetts, will ask Mr. Taft to make him a member of his cabinet. Mr. Ham-



mond's preference is understood to be the department of commerce and labor. He has ideas on the subject of making this department a real help to the commercial interests of the country, particularly the manufacturing industry, and many of his friends would like to see him have an opportunity to carry his plans into effect.

Mr. Hammond was active in the recent campaign. He took hold of the work of making useful the National League of Republican Clubs, and it is generally understood that he bore the expenses of this work out of his own private fortune. He is now planning to maintain permanent headquarters of the National league and to increase its membership and influence during the next four years.
