What It Means.

THE new mill now in the course of construction is perhaps the greatest boon that has come to Harlowton since the advent of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound Railroad. It will give the rancher in this vicinity a local market for their grain, and by furnishing this market will have the direct result of encouraging grain raising. The one circumstance that will make Harlowton a city is to have the bench lands surrounding the town under the plow. The virgin soil must be broken, and the smaller grains must be started to grow. The erection of the mill will have the effect to encourage agriculture along the lines of grain raising.

But, besides having this encouraging effect, it will also be an incentive to homeseekers and homesteaders to locate here. The farmers from the Dakotas, Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin, who come here, being accustomed to the local grain markets at home, naturally inquire, "Where is your elevator?" or "Where can we sell our grain?" or "Where is your market for grain?" To a large extent the towns of our sister states of the east are judged by the number of their elevators, and the number is generally indicative of the productiveness of the country. When the homeseeker comes from these states to Harlowton, he is at first confounded, and misjudges the country as to its fertility by the absence of a grain market. The mill supplies the deficiency. It will have the direct moral effect of convincing the trancient that there is something bigger and better behind Harlowton than the railroad and stock raising--a big, rich country.

Divorce.

NOT long ago Cardinal Gibbons attacked the divorce law of this country with some acrimony. The attack brought out discussions in law journals and magazines, and provoked counter attacks in meetings of the bench and bar.

On July 9th the Maryland Bar Association met at Old Point Comfort. Henry B. Brown, former justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, gave an address on the subject "The Law and its Procedure in Divorce". The discourse is perhaps one of the most learned discussions of the subject that has been given to the public for many years.

The judge held that divorce fairly obtained and on due and personal notice to the other side, generally rebounds to the welfare of both sides and proves a real blessing. The following paragraph from the address strikes the foundation of the reason for the law, and the reasoning is so sound that it cannot be contraverted: "A proper regard for the interests of the state as well as the preservation of domestic happiness, would seem to require that when the whole obligation of the matrimonial pact has been defeated by the habitual, persistent and uncontrollable conduct of either party, and that relation which should represent the acme of human happiness is made to stand for all that is most repugnant to our desires and anticipations, a severance of the tie should be permitted. The story of domestic unhappiness is often too familiar."

Wool Market.

THE wool season is drawing to a close. Most wool growers have disposed of their holdings at from 23 to 25 cents. At this price there is big money in wool, still the sheep men are compelled to go out of business on account of lack of range. A few years ago when there was unlimited range the price of wool was only 15, and at one time as low as 8 cents, but these adversities are prevalent in all lines of business. The market this year for wool was good from the beginning, and the number of large clips in this section brought considerable money into the country. The bank statements that will soon appear from the two local banks will tell tales of their own through rapid increase in deposits.
