

## Illustrations Good.

An idea of the growth and resources of the great Musselshell valley in Meagher county, of which Harlowton is the commercial center, is given by the Harlowton News, in the manner in which it celebrates its fourth birthday. July 2 the News begins its fourth year, and A. H. Eiselein, the editor and publisher, celebrates the event by issuing a thirty-two page paper, devoted in large parts to telling not only of something of the history of a section of Montana rich in historical associations, but also to setting forth the opportunities offered in that favored section of Montana.

The paper is not only filled with timely and interesting matter, but the illustrations are so varied and so true to life that aside from the text the publication is valuable because of the scenes, some of them never to be re-enacted in Montana, that are pictures on many of the pages.

This birthday number of the Harlowton News is something more than an illustration of the prosperity and progressiveness of the paper and its publisher. Such a publication would not be possible if the spirit which animated the publisher in getting out the number was not also shared by the business men and the community in which the paper is published. It shows a co-operation which accounts in no small measure for the growth of Harlowton and the Musselshell country. But more than anything else it shows how great and substantial has been the growth of that part of Montana. It is only a few years ago when there was no such place as Harlowton on the map. When R. A. Harlow extended his road to that point, the town was born, it has grown and the country has grown with it. Other towns have had the same opportunities, but Harlowton and its citizens took advantage of them, and to what extent the birthday number of the News is a substantial proof. 
