State News

Work is begun on the Episcopal Church at Malta.

Billings is to have a triple combination fire automobile engine.

Unallotted lands on the Flathead reservation were opened to entry on Monday.

A postoffice has been ordered established at Rumsey, Rosebud county.

The rains that came to the state recently were greatly appreciated by the farmers.

Five additional days were given the census men in which to do work in Great Falls and Helena.

Northern Pacific train No. 6 is now carrying mail from Helena to Bozeman, Livingston and Billings.

In various parts of the state measures are already in progress for celebrating the Fourth of July in a sane fashion.

W. A. Clark is soon expected to come into control of the plants and holdings of the Hamilton Light and Water Company.

Additions are still being made to the fund for the erection of the \$70,000 home which the Elks are planning to have in Missoula.

Petitions have been presented to the senate and house asking for woman suffrage signed by representatives of about fifty towns in Montana.

The Butte Barber's union has joined the International Union of Barbers. This step means affiliation with the American Federation of Labor.

Rumor that Superintendent Rapalji of the Rocky Mountain division of the Northern Pacific Railway is to be transferred has been confirmed.

The campaign in Gallatin Valley for the growing of sugar beets was recently ended, the result being that

1,600 acres were pledged. Much of the land is already seeded.

About June 1st the new hotel at Belton will be open to the patronage by the Great Northern Company. The hotel is planned for the use of visitors to McDonald Lake.

Building of cabins and fences through the Bitter Root National forest was recently completed and the rangers and supervisors have taken up their summer work in the forest.

Growth in the mail service at Kalspell has caused an addition to the number of mail clerks employed there and request has been made for additional carriers by July 1.

Reverend J. Bayne, pastor of the First Congregational Church at Laurel, preached his farewell sermon recently and has taken up residence on a farm in the Shields River Valley.

It is announced that 725 officers and men of the Montana National Guard will attend the army encampment at American Lake, Washington, from August 1 to 15.

The Northern Pacific Railway Company will raise vegetables this year on its property in the Paradise Valley, the products to be used in the dining car service of the company.

A number of new books have been given to the Billings public library by Mrs. Billings of New York. Ten volumes of the Laymen's Missionary Library have also been put in.

The annual reports of the associated charities of Great Falls, which was recently made public, shows that forty-six families were provided for by the organization during the past winter.

At a recent meeting of the Central Trades and Labor Council of Missoula county, the retail clerk's international protective association No. 91 and the Missoula building trades council were admitted to the council.

It is the general impression that as soon as the survey being made by the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Company of Lewistown to Great Falls is completed, that construction work on the line will be begun.

June 19, 20, 21 and 22, Great Falls will entertain the members of the seventh annual convention of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Montana. Each parish is entitled to four delegates while each mission has two. About thirty are expected to be present.

It is rumored that if right of way can be purchased at a low rate from property owners along the east shore of Flathead Lake that the Great Northern Company will build its southern branch this summer. It is likewise announced that if the right of way cannot be reasonably bought that the project will be abandoned.

The state convention of the Epworth League of the Montana Methodist Episcopal Churches will be held in Anaconda from June 23 to June 26. The Missoula chapter, which is the

largest and most active in the state, will charter a special car for the occasion and will send a large representation.

Convicts of the state have been put to public work, this being the first time this has occurred in the state's history. Sixty are engaged in road building, forty in making brick for additions to the state prison, and twenty-five in putting in the power plant on Race Track Creek, from where the prison is to be supplied with light and power.

W. B. Greely, chief forester of division number one, with headquarters at Missoula, recently conferred with officials of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railway in St. Paul, relative to the protection against forest fires in the forests through which the roads travel and to the value and amount of timber land in the state.


