FARMERS MUST UNDERSTAND SOIL
Plow the Ground Deep and Disc and Harrow Well.

Many farmers confronting the problem of plowing in the semi-arid regions for the first time find it hard to determine the best method to use. This is a question which the dry farmer in each locality must answer for himself, but a thorough understanding of the subject of plowing and the effect it has upon the soil, will enable him to form a better opinion of how the soil should be handled. The Northwestern Stockman and Farmer has the following on the subject:
The method of plowing land in the fall and in the spring will, of course, vary somewhat. Most of the sod land in the semi-arid regions is plowed early in the spring or summer. Plowed at this season of the year there is sufficient moisture to make the plowing quite easy and also the green vegetation when turned under at this time more quickly decays.
Perhaps the best results have been obtained on dry land by plowing the soil during the months of May, June and July. If the sod is very stiff it is not possible to plow it as deep as it is if the soil is a little less compact. A good rule to keep in mind is that the deeper the farmer plows the more moisture he will save. It is also found that the length of time between plowing and seeding will have a marked effect on the type of plowing. The land should be plowed long enough before seeding that it will have time to settle and exclude the unnecessary amount of air before the seed is put in. This is a question of vital importance to the dry farmer. Sod land that is plowed in the spring for the purpose of raising a winter crop is usually plowed to the depth of about five inches. The plow is then followed by a disc and harrow. The disc is for the purpose of packing down the soil and excluding the excess of air. A soil mulch is made over the surface by the action of the harrow. Some farmers disc and harrow their plowing two or three times as soon as possible after the land has been plowed. They claim that by so doing they are more able to secure a good seed bed. Experience teaches that better results have been obtained by plowing deep because it gives the roots and other organic matter a better chance to decay, also it makes it possible to place the seed in the moist soil.

Land that has been plowed in the spring must receive care during the summer. If we have a good soil mulch upon our soil it is possible to save a great deal of moisture. This means that after each rain we should get on and disc and harrow in order to stir up the surface soil and form the much needed mulch. If the land is to be plowed late in the fall, the method will not differ materially. We actually plow to the depth of five to seven inches and then if there is considerable time before winter it is a good plan to follow the plow with disc and harrow. However, if the plowing is delayed until quite late in the fall it is not always necessary to follow the plow with the disc and harrow. Soil will not lose very much moisture and if it is allowed to remain open during the winter season it will catch and hold the rains and snows. The action of the weather will also tend to pulverize the land. If the land that is plowed early in the fall is not properly cared for it will become very lumpy and cloddy. It is most impossible to work these clods down in the fall or in the spring. For that reason they should be broken up as soon as the land is turned over. Early in the spring land is not plowed as deeply as it is if handled later in the spring or in the fall. This is true because it is not possible for the soil to settle and for capillary action to become established in sufficient time to permit the growth of plants. Land plowed in this season should not be allowed to remain for any length of time after it is turned over, that it should be disc or har-

rowed in order to prevent the rapid evaporation of moisture. If this is not done, the land will become cloddy and will, therefore, be very difficult to work.
Briefly it might be stated that we plow shallow in the spring, deeper in the summer and still deeper in the fall; also the land should be disc and harrowed after plowing. This, however, is not so important in the late spring plowing as it is at other times. The thing to be remembered is to plow as deep as possible, pack the soil down and cover with a dust mulch.—The Meagher Republican.

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
