**RAILROAD IS COMPLETED**

White Sulphur Springs is Connected  
With Outside World—Many People  
Witness Last Spike Driven.

On Sunday, October 30th, amid the blowing of whistles of locomotives and the cheering of the assembled townfolks, the last spike on the White Sulphur Springs and Yellowstone Park Railway was driven, and what was the dream of years at last became a reality. White Sulphur Springs was given railroad communication with the outside world, says the Meagher County Republican.

During the past week interested groups of people could be seen on the street corners looking southward across the valley, marking the advance of the line of construction. Every field and opera glass in the town was brought into service for the purpose of watching the progress of this enterprise, which was the biggest event in the history of the town.

On Sunday morning the construction train came within easy distance of the town, and as early as nine o'clock crowds had gathered at the grade to watch the track laying machine at work, and the little brown men busily following after driving spikes and firming the joints. As the construction train slowly crept along excited boys and men climbed aloft the box cars, which carried the ties, eager for the experience of riding on a train and for the distinction of riding into the old town on the first train, an incident which they will treasure and repeat many times in years to come. During the day the earlier crowds were augmented, until at four o'clock the whole town populace was there to witness the driving of the last spike. It was the most memorable day in the history of the old town. Children who had never seen a railroad, old men and women who doubted that one would ever be built into the valley, saw the realization of their hopes, and together they joined in one loud and triumphant cheer.

As we stood there and listened to the cheer after cheer that went up, we could not but help notice the expressions that stole over some of the faces. We stood beside an old timer, forty years of whose life had been spent in the valley. He was gray, bent with years, and showed the evidence of exposure to the elements. Plainly his thoughts were those of disappointment. Probably he was disappointed at the thought that the railroad would bring in new blood, and change the old order of things, or probably he was disappointed at the thought that now in his declining years, after years of hard toll, his hopes were realized, but to late for

## McQUITTY AND SARTER ELECTED BY LARGE MAJORITY

**Democrats Make Big Gains in Election--Fifteen Democratic Senators Assured**

Democratic Governors Elected in Thirteen States, Republicans, in Twelve-

F. S. Webster, George Williams and Miss Francisco

Win--Much Interest is Shown.

Last Tuesday turned out to be a general political upheaval day. Democracy made big gains in former Republican states, while Republicans gain in some former strongholds of Democracy. In Meagher County I. S. McQuitty and Theodore Sarter, the former a Democrat and the latter a Republican will go to the legislature.

The complexion of the United States Senate is now definitely settled. The Republicans are assured of 17 senators, which, with holdover, senators, give them a total of 50. The democrats are assured of 15 new senators, which, with 25 holdovers, give them a total of 40. One senatorship is still in doubt the successor of Mr. Carter in Montana where there is a prospect of a tie. The determined total however, leaves a republican majority in the senate as follows: Total majority, 92; number necessary to majority, 47; republicans, 51; democrats, 40; doubtful, 1.

The 17 republican senators assured are from California, Connecticut, Delaware, Iowa, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Michigan, Nevada, North Dakota (2), Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

The 15 democratic senators considered assured are from Florida, Indiana, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Missouri, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

It is not yet definitely known on what date the celebration will take place, but it will be after regular train service over the new lines has been established.

The celebration is to be held on Tuesday, Nov. 15. A large number of Harlowton people expect to help White Sulphur Springs celebrate.

The governorships of Idaho and North Dakota is not yet reported as being beyond doubt.

**LIFELESS BODY FOUND**

**Murdered Victims Corpse is Found Hanging to a Tree Near Roundup.**

Roundup Nov. 5.—The lifeless body of Loyd Bishop was found today hanging to the limb of a tree in a coulee one and a half miles east of mine No. 4 in Yellowstone county by some children wandering through the woods. Deputy Sheriff Young of Kinn investigated, and stated it was his opinion that Bishop had been murdered and his body hung to the tree as a blind, as there is a bullet wound in the head of the corpse, besides other marks of violence. About four weeks ago Bishop received \$140.00 from his parents in Iowa, which he proceeded to spend in the restricted district. That was the last time anyone in the city remembers seeing Bishop alive. Bishop's body was in a standing position, his hand in his pants pockets. A handkerchief served as the hangman's noose. From the length of time that Bishop has been missing and the appearance of his body when found, it is believed that he had been dead about two or three weeks.
