

NEWS OF THE STATE

Items gathered from our contemporaries

It is announced that the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound company will build a branch line by way of Trail creek from Bozeman, or by way of Shields valley from Dorsey, to the Yellowstone National Park.

The law passed at the last session of the legislature providing for an increase in the membership and efficiency of the national guard of Montana was opposed by the labor organizations of the state and those organizations have inaugurated a movement to secure the abrogation of the law through a popular vote at the next general election to be held Nov. 5, 1912. The law provides for severe penalties if the labor organization discriminates against the admission of a man to membership in a union if he is a member of a militia company, and a man who is a member of a union is compelled by law to take up arms against that union in case of any strike troubles.

The post office of Miles City has been designated by the postmaster general as a postal savings depository. This is one of 36 additional banks provided for in a proclamation issued this week, and makes a total of 129 established since January first.

During the present month sales of state lands are to be conducted in five counties of the state, viz.: 30,000 acres will be offered in Meagher county; 65,000 in Chouteau and 30,000 in Valley, the lands to be on sale May 26.

On May 2 the senate confirmed the appointment of William Lindsay, of Glendive, as United States marshal for Montana, and he assumed the duties of the office on Monday of this week.

A number of school teachers of Montana are making preparations to attend the forty-ninth annual convention of the National Educational association, to be held in San Francisco July 8 to 14. Eight panels of larch veneer have been sent to a furniture manufactory in Michigan and will be used in test pieces of furniture. This is the first time that the Montana larch has been used in making furniture and if it is successful, the concern will make larch furniture as a business. Samples of the veneer are also at the Empire Lumber company at Minneapolis for exhibition.

An effort is to be made by Montana cattlemen to have a recent department order of the commissioner of Indian affairs that the cattle of all white men must be removed from the Blackfoot Indian reservation by July 1st, rescinded.

The post office department has granted free delivery to Havre, service to be instituted July 1st.
