**TERMS OF SALE**

The foregoing list gives a description of each tract, the number of acres in each and the appraised price at which it may be sold. The land will be offered in units of one quarter section each, or such part of the quarter section as the State may own. No state land can be sold for less than the appraised price. The purchaser may at his option pay all cash, or fifteen per cent cash and the balance in twenty equal, annual payments with interest at the rate of five per cent per annum.

All lands under lease are sold subject to the rights of the lessee and the conditions of the lease. Possession will be given the purchaser January 1, 1913, but if the lease expires prior to that date, possession will be given at the termination of the lease, provided settlement is made with the lessee for his improvements upon the land, if any, as provided in Chapt. 147 laws of 1909. Agreements between the purchaser and the lessee for an earlier occupation of the land by the purchaser may be entered into, but the rentals will be collected from the lessee up to January 1, 1913 regardless who the purchaser may be.

Deductions will be made in the area of any tract for reservoir sites or for right-of-way for any purpose sold by the State; but no deductions will be made for an easement granted for public roads or for other purposes for which the State received no compensation, as the land covered by such easement will revert to the purchaser in case of abandonment. The State reserves all the right and title to all coal, oil and gas contained in said land, and the right to enter thereon to prospect and mine same. All bids are received subject to the approval of the State Board of Land Commissioners.

**\$50 IN GOLD FOR BIG POTATO; \$75 OFFERED FOR SACK OF THEM**

Montana has long had a reputation as a potato country. No section of the world can produce finer varieties of the tuber than the Treasure State. As proof of this attention has often been called to the fact that the Burlington railroad maintains a farm in this state where are grown all of the potatoes used on the dining cars of that system. What this means is better appreciated when it is recalled that the Burlington pieces such states as Iowa, Illinois, Nebraska, Minnesota, Missouri and Colorado, in all of which the potato crop has long been a leading industry.  
In the irrigated portions of Montana, the valleys of the Gallatin, the Yellowstone, in the Bitter Root, the Flathead, on the dry farming benches of Northern Montana, Dawson and Fergus counties, in fact in every section of Montana, potatoes which defy comparison are grown and the interest the farmers are manifesting in this crop during the present year is greater than ever.  
Because of this fact the officers of the Montana State Fair, who are working for a "Greater Montana" in every line, are offering special inducements to potato growers to exhibit at the fair this fall (Sept. 23 to 28). Aside from the regular cash prizes offered by the fair management the board of directors announce that some unusually attractive cash prizes have been arranged for. For instance, Walter A. Pocock, manager of the Ryan hotel in St. Paul, has informed the board that he will give \$50 in gold, divided into five monies, for the largest single smooth potato grown in Montana during the season of 1912. P. P. S. Lindsay of Helena offers \$50 in gold for the 100-pound sack containing the least number of potatoes and exhibited at the fair, and the fair management has added \$25, making it a \$75 cash prize.  
Another valuable prize is offered for the best collection of potatoes grown by one exhibitor and containing not less than four varieties. This special \$75 premium is given by the Oliver Chilled Plow Works, and the winner will secure fame far beyond the boundaries of Montana, for the winning exhibit is to become the property of the Oliver people and is to be used for exhibition purposes outside of the state.  
In catering thus to the potato industry of Montana, the fair management believes it is building up a business which in years to come will be one of the most profitable lines to the agriculturist in the commonwealth. The fair management already is assured of a potato exhibit this fall far in the lead of anything of the kind ever shown at a Montana fair.
