## HAVE YOUR SEED TESTED

The seed law, which was passed by the 1913 legislature, goes into effect January 1, 1914. This means that all lots of agricultural seed, of one pound and up, sold in the state, must bear a label giving the percentage of purity and the percentage and date of germination, also the approximate percentage of quack grass, wild oats, fanweed, dodder and mustard. If these percentages are not known the seed must be sold as "unclean seed." "Unclean seed" is not easy to sell and there is no excuse for such labelling. The seed laboratory at the Experiment Station at Bozeman is now equipped and makes these tests free of charge for any citizen of Montana.

If you have seed to sell, or are in doubt about some seed that you have purchased, or are going to purchase, send us a sample for analysis. Send it early because

there will be a big rush about the first of January and someone may have to wait. These tests take from 6 to 26 days, so submit your sample several days before you desire to use the seed. Send not less than 2 oz. of small seed such as clover, timothy, alfalfa, etc. and not less than 4 oz. of the larger grains such as wheat, oats, rye, barley and corn.

Always state whether you want purity or germination tests or both. These samples should be sent by parcel post to the State Grain Laboratory at Bozeman, Montana.

George K. Robertson of Lennep shipped a bunch of lambs to the Chicago market that netted him \$3.11 each. This price is not as good as he received last year as they netted him \$4.40. The lambs weighed two pounds less than last year. He generally gets the top price as George is one of the best sheep men in Meagher county.
