NEW SCHOOLHOUSE FOR CITY OF OKA

The trustees of the Harlowton school district have arranged for a school at Oka. They will build a new schoolhouse in the near future, but in order that the children there shall not be deprived of schooling this winter they have arranged to rent a building for school purposes at once. This will be an added blessing to the people living adjacent to Oka and one they were sorely in need of.

The trustees of this district cannot receive too much praise for the interest they take in the schools. They are wide awake and always alive to the interests of the children. They have built up here, in four years, one of the best schools in the state, and now seeing the need of a school at Oka, at once made arrangements for the same.

SEASON'S WORK EXPERIMENT FARM

The experimental farm has completed its threshing for this year and the crops gave a splendid average. Everyone here knows where the farm is and the land is very common. Mr. Arbes is in charge of the farm and has surely produced good results. There is no chance to irrigate any of the land.

The oats threshed 362 bushels off seven acres or nearly 52 bushels to the acre. The speltz and flax went nearly 30 bushels to the acre or 147 bushels from five acres. The spring wheat was the poorest crop averaging only fourteen and a half bushels to the acre.

Two acres of the oats were not as good as the rest. Mr. Arbes has been feeding three horses sheep oats ever since it was cut and for the past two weeks the horses, pigs and chickens were fed different grains in the sheaf thus cutting down the averages on the threshed grain.
