Bush, who gives O'Brien, Montana, as his post-office address, did on December 16, 1913, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead, serial No. 017620, made May 27, 1912, for south half of the north half, section 22, township 5 north, range 18 east Montana Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said entryman has wholly abandoned said land and has never resided thereon, that said entryman has been absent from said land or the vicinity thereof since June 1912, and that said land is now in its native wild condition, wholly unimproved.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be cancelled thereunder without your further right to be heard therein either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the fourth publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office the proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.
