MORE RAILROAD DOPE.

A recent Fernie dispatch has some railroad news which is of local interest and bears out the statements frequently made by Great Northern railroad men who are taking account of the work going on above Gateway, that the Canadian Pacific will continue the line down the Kootenai river.

A branch of the Crows Nest line is being constructed, leaving the line at Galoway, east of the point where the Kootenai Central joins, and extending southwardly towards the international boundary. It is thought that it is the intention of the C. P. R. to continue this line on south, crossing the Kootenai on this side of the line and again re-

crossing it on the other, thus forming an entirely new C. P. R. line to Spokane.

The Kootenai Central is being built under a charter which calls for a continuous line south from Golden to some point at or near Elko and from there on to some point on the international boundary. The branch being graded south from Galoway would meet the requirements of that charter.

It is stated in favor of the line said to be in contemplation by the G. P. R., which necessitates two bridges across the Kootenai to reach Spokane, that a much better grade could be secured over such a route, thus giving an all C. P. R. route and making it independent of the Spokane International, now used by the big Canadian line.
