P. N. Bernard was down from Eureka Saturday.

The Odd Fellows' dance this evening promises to be a big success.

Mrs. G. R. Blackwell has gone to Cottage Grove, Ore., to spend the winter with relatives.

The big taxpayer of the county, the Great Northern Railway company, sent in their remittance last Saturday.

Complaints have been made in several localities of parties who are charged with killing more deer than the law allows.

A marriage license was issued yesterday to Miles J. Gilmore of Old Mission, Mich., and Mary J. Jenkins of Spokane.

For the past two or three days, as a wind-up of the open deer season, there has been a steady bombardment in the hills adjoining the city.

The forestry people gave their annual dance last Saturday evening in the Kootenai Club hall, in which the members and their guests had a most enjoyable time.

A government fish car passed through yesterday and left 27 cans of young fish for distribution in the creeks south of town, under the direction of Mike Wallace, who certainly knows where they ought to go.

At the teachers examinations last Friday and Saturday at Libby and Eureka, R. V. Tanner, Helen Shater, Ruby Christiana and An-

tonio Grandjean of Libby were successful and Robt. Moir of Eureka was given a professional grade.

Jas. Yeo of Butte will put in a stump pulling machine in Libby next spring and we may expect to see some extensive clearing of stump lands in this vicinity next season. It will be the first stump pulling machine to operate in the Kootenai valley.

Al and Harry Howard have returned from the Howard Gulch placers, where they have been doing representation work. They report the property in good shape and are well satisfied with the steady improvement shown in all work done upon the proposition.

Alf. Diefendorfer, H. Burns, P. P. Reynolds and J. I. Kirby, all of Sheridan, Wyo., and N. J. Littlejohn of Lewistown, Mont., are visitors in the city, guests of J. J. O'Marr. They are interested in the waterworks and electric light proposition and are looking over the situation as it stands today on the eve of practical operation.

Thos. Conners, who was in jail here on a charge of having held up McMillan of Warland and relieved him of his roll of over \$90, plead guilty last Monday and was sentenced to eighteen months in the penitentiary by Judge Erickson. Conners is said to have been wanted also at Eureka on a theft charge and the officers are of the opinion that he is an old offender. The sheriff take him to Deer Lodge tomorrow.

County Commissioners Pratt, Gary and Bartlett went to Oregon last Saturday to inspect some bridges, as guests of the Coast Bridge Company of Portland. They will also visit the bridge at Columbia Falls and other points in this section, at the solicitation of bridge builders who expect to build the bridges across the Kootenai river. There will be little objection to these trips, which are in the nature of junketing affairs, since the county is out nothing

and the commissioners will have the opportunity of acquiring a lot of valuable information bearing upon one of the most important matters likely to arise during their tenure of office.

From last Sunday's Spokesman-Review. Another natural wonder of the west is being unfolded by the development of Glacier national park in northwestern Montana, 298 miles from Spokane on the Great Northern. The park is situated in the heart of the Rocky mountains and the accompanying illustration demonstrates the character of the scenery from which the park takes its name. Lake McDonald is conceded to be one of the most magnificent mountain water reservoirs in the world, although its beauties have but lately been brought to public attention.

Summer touring possibilities of the park have recently become of local importance to Spokane through the appropriation by Lincoln county (Mont.) of \$125,000 for road and bridge building in the park region. The completion of this work will give Spokane direct automobile connection with the park, closing up the last gap in the road route from this city. This will bring the park within a couple of days jaunt by touring car through the finest scenic region of the whole Inland Empire and intermountain region.
