NEWS OF 16 YEARS AGO

(Items culled from old Troy Times.)

Sylvanite had a narrow escape from destruction by forest fires. Several buildings were scorched, but hard work on the part of campers and residents prevented more serious damage.

The campaign was on. A Times reporter made a canvass of the town and could find but one "goldbug." If there were others, the report adds, "they were singing pretty low."

Bids were invited by the county for the construction of a wagon road, about 20 miles long, from Troy to Sylvanite.

The air was filled with smoke. Heavy forest fires were reported raging in the Yahk, on Bull river and between Libby and Troy.

Twenty thousand people met the "Silver Tougued Bryan" at his home at Lincoln, Neb., and gave him a rousing welcome.

Chas. S. Allard, known as the "Montana buffalo king," died in Chicago while undergoing a surgical operation. He had lived in Montana for 35 years, coming to the territory with his parents when a boy of 8 years.

The goldbug papers of the east were throwing bouquets at Bryan. The New York Post said he was a blatherskite running on a platform of dishonesty. The Philadelphia Inquirer said of Bryan and the Chicago convention: "They propose free trade, free silver, free riot and tree hell."
