Electives

Music, Manual Training, Physical Geography and other subjects may be taken as electives with consent of the superintendent. The last two years of Latin are not absolutely required and electives may be substituted. Public Speaking, Penmanship and Chapel singing are required of the entire school. No classes will be formed unless four or more students wish to take the same subject.

School Activities

The Boys' Glee Club made great progress the past year and gives promise of becoming quite a factor in school activities for the coming year.

The Girls' Chorus brought out some excellent talent. They can now sing new and difficult selections at sight. It is hoped to feature this work for the coming year.

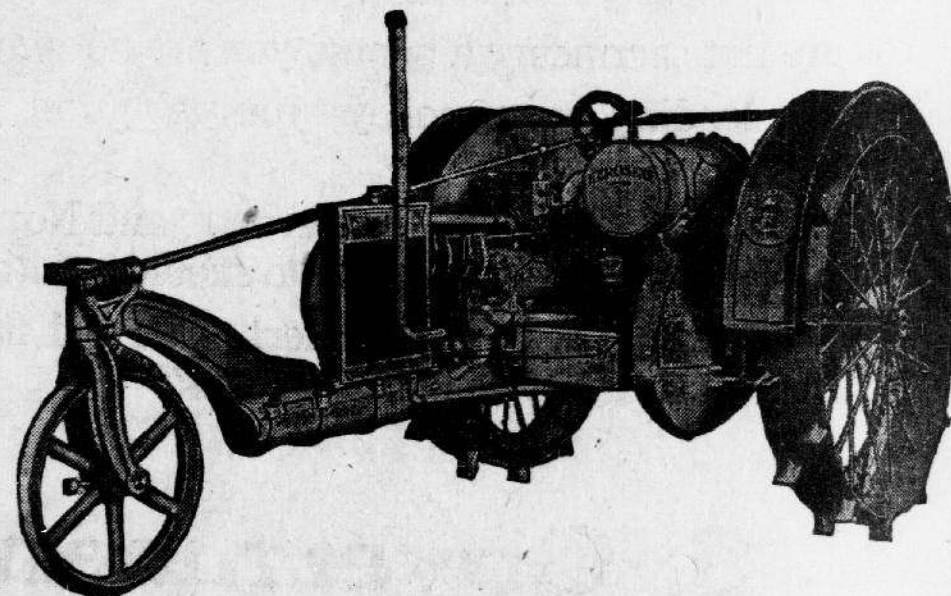
