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**A MENACE TO OUR DEMOCRA-
CY AND SUCCESS OF ARMS**

Help Defeat the Sims' Water Bill and
the Coal Oil and Gas Bills Now
in Congress—Back Up Presi-
dent Wilson

The Germans fought to secure pos- session of areas of France containing valuable resources. They are still fighting futilely to retain such pos- session. Our boys are giving their lives to drive these predatory Huns out of this territory they maliciously seized. At the same time, a group of would-be monopolists in America are endeavoring, through powerful, well-financed lobbies to jam through congress bills which will give them possession practically without cost to them and for a long period of years, of natural resources of the United States, conservatively valued at scores of billions of dollars.

The Sims Water Power Bill, Sen- ate 1419, creates a commission con- sisting of the Secretaries of War, of the Interior, and of Agriculture, em- powered to lease the water power of the country for a term of not less than fifty years, and makes it impos- sible for the Government to recapture them at the expiration of this term, because of the condition of payment which are so onerous to the Government. No excuse can be of- fered for this bill. The President asked Congress not to pass it.

Bill, Senate 2812, entitled "Explor- ation for and Disposition of Coal, Phosphates, Oil, Oil Shales, or Gas" permits the leasing of land contain- ing these very valuable natural re- sources on terms which are substan- tially a gift. It is provided that a royalty for extracting coal shall be fixed at "not less than two cents per ton." This bill is direct interference with the conduct of the war and has been so stigmatized by the Secretary of the Navy and the Department of Justice. It would validate fraudulent titles to oil lands in the valuable oil reserves. It would alienate enorm- ous valuable supplies of coal, phos- phates, oil, oil shales and gas.

Both these bills are part of the propaganda against Government ownership and operation of railroads as they will interfere with the cheap- er electrification of the railroads, and increase the price of coal, which must be used by the railroads, thus increas- ing freight rates and making people discontented with Government own- ership and operation.

We ask that you and every loyal American citizen will promptly write or telegraph the President, urging him to veto both these bills if enact- ed, as they may be rushed through Congress, and also to your United States Senators and Congressmen, opposing them.
