LEAGUE VICTORY IN SHERIDAN COUNTY OVERWHELMING

Farmers Nominate Entire Ticket By Such Majorities As to Foretell Complete Victory Next Fall—Democratic Vote Twice as Large as Republicans in Sheridan County.

STANGELAND BEATS COMER ABOUT 4 TO 1

The Farmers victory in Sheridan county was overwhelming, indicating that the farmers stuck as they never stuck before. The vote was heavier than usual and the farmers voted early and they voted straight, indicating that they have learned to vote for principle and not for men.

The vote indicates that the league will elect every officer in both Sheridan and Daniels county at the November elections.

B. K. Wheeler and the entire league ticket carried Sheridan county by majorities of about seven to one, and there is very little difference between the totals.

The contest that overshadowed everything else in Sheridan and Roosevelt counties was the judicial contest, the old gang of both counties straining every muscle and effort to nominate C. E. Comer, now on the bench as the appointee of Governor Stewart and a former member of the Sheridan County Council of Defense, over A. W. Stangeland, the league and labor candidate, on the Democratic ticket.

Stangeland however snatched Comer under, receiving in the district, with 5 more precincts, Stangeland precincts, to hear from, on the democratic ticket, 2,057 votes to Comer's 578 votes in the entire district. Stangeland received 1512 votes on the democratic ticket in Sheridan county, to Comer's 280 votes.

On the Republican ticket, Comer received in the district 857 votes and Stangeland received about 50 votes on the Republican ticket. Comer received on both the Republican and Democratic ticket the total number of 1430 votes, in the precincts reported. Stangeland will have a clear majority of about 800 votes when the reports are all in. This indicates that the election of Stangeland for judge in the fall election is beyond a doubt and the fact that the people of the twentieth judicial district have repudiated C. E. Comer and will have nothing of him.

Another interesting feature of the Sheridan county election was the race between J. J. Gunther and L. J. Onstad for the nomination for the office of county attorney on the republican ticket. No one filed for the nomination, but the friends of both parties worked for the nomination of their favorite, but it seems that Gunther is the more popular man, at least he got the most votes. As reported in the Producers News some time ago, the old gang supported Gunther for county attorney as the price for his laying down and retiring from the race for the republican nomination for judge. The statement proves true and indicates that Mr. Gunther has been deal-

ing with the enemy as many people have suspected for some time. The honor will be an empty one, however, as Gunther has not a ghost of a show to be elected and will be beaten three or four to one. Mr. Gunther was elected in the first place by the league, which organization he sadly disappointed.

The vote for Sheridan county, complete, unofficial, with the exception of the Coalridge precinct, which is Nonpartisan, is as follows:

48ERS IN FARMER-LABOR PARTY

All But Handful Join Rapidly Growing New Party, Says Parley Christensen, the Big Dane Candidate.

New York, (N. Y. Bureau)—Parley Parker Christensen, Farmer-Labor Party candidate for the presidency, smilingly dismissed as "unimportant" the fact that the insurgent element of the Committee had issued a referendum to all Forty-Eighters with a statement of reasons why they ought to maintain a separate organization. "Our national treasurer, Mr. McGill, was a leader of the Forty-eighters," he said, "and more than half of our most active workers in this campaign are men who were active in that organization. All but a handful of the Forty-eighters entered the Farmer-Labor party convention and helped to establish the Farmer-Labor Party. They have not quit; they are working with the rest of us to build a party for the workers with hand and brain—the farmers and the wage-workers and all who stand for our program."

MONTANA NON-PARTISANS WIN PRIMARY ELECTION

The available returns from the Tuesday's primaries over the state as we go to press indicate that Wheeler has been nominated for Governor on the Democratic ticket by an overwhelming majority, the old liners and standpatters appear to have lost out at all points all the way down the line.

The following dispatch from Helena indicates how the matters stand as we go to press: Helena, Mont., Aug. 25.—

Former United States Attorney B. K. Wheeler, endorsed by the Nonpartisan League, was nominated for governor by the Democratic party in the primary election held in this state yesterday. Incomplete returns from 452 precincts, including the large cities, give Wheeler 15,024 votes to 9,753 for Lieutenant Governor W. W. McDowell and 1,686 votes for A. A. Carr. Former United States Senator J. M. Dixon was leading for the Republican nomination for governor late today with 9,206 votes. Harry L. Wilson, his nearest opponent, on the same returns had 8,610, and Attorney General H. C. Ford was third with 5,114.

ENGLAND RECOGNIZES INDEPENDENCE OF EGYPT

After Carrying on a Warfare of Such Barbarous Cruelty as Have Horrified the World, Britain Forced to Leave Egypt.

London, Aug. 25.—Terms of the Egyptian agreement between Lord Milner and Zagloul Pasha are announced by the London Daily Herald, which says the program includes the following: Abolition of the British protectorate. Great Britain to recognize the independence of Egypt. Complete withdrawal of the British army of occupation except a Suez canal guard of two or three thousand.

British officials in Egypt to join the Egyptian government service or leave the country within a specified time. Under these terms, if they are ratified by the British parliament and the Egyptian assembly, Egypt will recognize Great Britain's "privileged position in the East."

PAUL KETTERMAN IN FATAL ACCIDENT

A very sad accident occurred at the Big Muddy, about two miles south of town last Sunday, when Paul Kitterman in making a high dive struck shallow water and going to the bottom his head came in contact with a large rock, which cut a severe gash in his scalp and dislocated the fifth vertebrae in his spine. The young lad was assisted from the water by several of his chums who were with him at the time and immediately rushed to town for aid. An examination showed the injuries to be of a most serious nature and Monday it was decided to take him to the hospital at Williston, but he died on the train just before reaching Bainville.

Paul is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kitterman who live near Welliver. He was a young man of pleasant disposition and had a host of friends who feel deeply the untimely death of this young man. Funeral services were held at the Catholic church Thursday morning and interment was in the local cemetery.

FRAZIER SPEAKS TO LARGE CROWD AT SCOBEY

The Daniels county farmers turned out in mass to hear the farmer governor of North Dakota, Lynn J. Frazier, at Scobey, the Daniels county capitol last Saturday afternoon, when he spoke at the huge final league rally. Hon. S. J. Nyquist, league county attorney of Daniels county, presided at the meeting. R. C. Arnold spoke and was well received. Mr. Arnold was followed by Attorney Stangeland and then Governor Frazier was introduced and was received with prolonged applause, and the interesting talk that he delivered was frequently interrupted by applause.

Governor Frazier made an impression on his hearers and done a lot to help erase the prejudice entertained against the League by many of the citizens of Scobey and the coming fall it is being predicted, that the league ticket will come out of Scobey with an even break.

CHRISTENSEN SENDS CONGRATULATIONS TO BRITISH LABOR PARTY

Chicago, Aug. 16.—Parley P. Christensen, farmer-labor party candidate for president, today sent a cablegram to William C. Adamson, chairman of the British labor party, congratulating the British workers on their determination to resist military intervention against Russia. The message follows: "British labor's magnificent determination to resist any form of military intervention against soviet Russia is humanity's most striking victory over capitalist militarism. You have laid the foundation for a real world league of labor by setting the glorious example of labor's power to veto war. Please extend to British labor party heartfelt admiration of American farmer-labor party."

FRAZIER RECEIVES OVATION AT OUTLOOK

North Dakota's Famous Farmer Governor, the Only Equal Sodbuster in a Governor's Chair, in the United States, Greeted By Two Thousand People Sunday.

PROGRAM OF SPORTS WAS SUCCESS

Two thousand people greeted the famous farmer Governor of North Dakota at Outlook last Sunday afternoon when he arrived.

Governor Frazier, the only real sodbuster in any governor's chair in the United States.

The people of Outlook and visitors from over the county who had collected to hear Governor Frazier, gave him an ovation when he arose to speak.

The crowd was the largest ever collected in Outlook, and the business men and farmers had united to make the day the biggest affair ever held in that section of the country and they did.

There was a splendid program of games and sports such as the usual kinds of novelty races, and many of the young people participated to the great delight of everybody.

The farmers run a refreshment stand, the profit of which, which were small, went to the League campaign fund. The Red Cross Ladies run a lunch counter for the benefit of the Outlook General Community Hospital, and in the evening the members of the American Legion gave a dance for the benefit of the hospital.

At two o'clock in the afternoon, the speaking commenced. R. C. Arnold was introduced and spoke on the program, then Governor Frazier was presented to the huge audience and was greeted with an ovation. The governor told in detail of the struggle of the farmers for the control of the state and economic justice in the neighboring state. The governor spoke for over an hour and received another demonstration of appreciation when he closed his address.

The Outlook Rally was a huge success from every standpoint and again demonstrates that the farmers and small town business men can work together harmoniously.

Arthur Reuber took Frazier to Lambert in Richland county Monday where the Governor made his final address in the Montana campaign. Another monster audience greeted him at that place.

ROOSEVELT CO. GOES OVER FOR LEAGUE

Democrats Cast the Most Votes in the County to the South—All League Candidates are Nominated by Large Majorities.

DIXON, REPUBLICAN CARRIES COUNTY

The forces of democracy won in Roosevelt county over the sinister forces of corruption at the Primaries Tuesday, the democratic party casting more votes than the republican, which indicates that the entire league endorsed ticket will win in November in the neighboring county.
