PREDICTS A RUSH OF U. S. TRAVELERS TO RUSSIA SOON

New York, Jan. 26.—A large movement of industrial emigrants from the United States to Russia during the coming spring and summer was predicted today by A. A. Heller, American representative of the Soviet government's supreme council of national economy.

Mr. Heller said groups of artisans, farmers and other workers were being formed by the Soviet for technical aid to Soviet Russia in various parts of the country. Most of these groups are Russians, but some are native Americans.

To these groups would be leased factories and land to be exploited on a co-operative basis, he said.

Agricultural colonies of Russians in Arizona, the Dakotas, California, and western Idaho soon will send delegates to Russia Mr. Heller said, to select settlement sites.
