Congress.

Resume of the Week's Proceedings.

Washington, Feb. 20.—Senator Reed Smoot's address to the senate yesterday in defense of his position as senator was the feature of the session. He was supported by Senator Dillingham of Vermont in a speech analytical of the evidence which had been submitted in the case.

The senate spent several hours in further consideration of the forestry provisions in the agricultural appropriation bill.

After passing a number of bills under unanimous consent yesterday, the house resumed consideration of the postoffice appropriation bill.

Washington, Feb. 21.—The four-year contest against Reed Smoot as a senator of the United States from Utah was ended yesterday when 42 of his colleagues voted to sustain him, as against 28 for the resolution to unseat him. Added to this there were nine pairs, making the actual standing on the resolution 37 to 51. Senator Smoot did not vote, and Senator Wetmore was absent and not paired.

A night session was held, at which the naval appropriation bill and the river and harbor appropriation bill were passed.

In the House.

The postoffice appropriation bill, the largest ever reported, passed the house yesterday. All the provisions relating to increased pay, affecting 90 per cent of the postal employees and which yesterday were stricken out on points of order, were restored to the bill.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Smarter under what they considered unfair treatment the Democrats resorted to a systematic series of objections against provisions in the sundry civil bill yesterday in the house. They compelled the Republicans to maintain 100 members, a quorum of the committee of the whole. The house passed a number of bills and resolutions including one enlarging the act relating to shanghaiing.

The reading of the agricultural bill was completed in the senate after most of the day had been spent in debate on the forestry system and the grazing land provisions, and the measure will again be considered to-day for final action.

Washington, Feb. 23.—The senate at last night's session passed the bill making appropriations for the support of the military academy.

A discussion lasting throughout the entire day, to which was added a futile night session, failed to secure final action on the amendments to the agricultural appropriation bill proposed to make an increase of \$1,000,000 in the bill for the support of the forest reserve service.

The house in committee of the whole placed itself squarely on record yesterday in favor of limiting the power of special agents of the department of the interior by a vote restricting the use of the appropriation of \$250,000 covered by the sundry civil appropriation bill to pay the salaries of such agents.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The house Saturday passed the sundry civil appropriation bill.

Under a rule reported from the committee on rules by Mr. Dalzell of Pennsylvania, the house amended its substitute for the La Follette sixteen-hour railroad employees bill by an affirmative vote of 279, there being no negative votes cast.

The house agreed to the conference report on the legislative, executive and judicial bill.

Although the senate devoted four hours to legislative matters, nothing was done.

Washington, Feb. 26.—Ship subsidy secured a marked impetus yesterday in the house, which before adjournment adopted a rule that will probably insure the passage by the house of the Littauer substitute for the senate bill and result before the final adjournment in positive legislation. The rule provides that a final vote shall be taken not later than next Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The conference report on the Indian appropriation bill was adopted, as was the conference report on the bill providing for the allotment and distribution of Indian tribal funds.

The senate "passed" the agricultural appropriation bill, carrying nearly \$10,000,000; the postoffice appropriation bill, carrying \$210,000,000; the pension appropriation bill, carrying \$145,000,000, and the bill authorizing the establishment of an agricultural bank in the Philippine islands.

By a vote of 43 to 19 the senate ratified the Santo Domingo treaty. This was one more vote in the affirmative than was required.

Solons Going to Panama.
Washington, Feb. 27.—A congressional party of about fifty members of the house and senate will call for the isthmus of Panama on March 6. The party will be on the canal zone until March 18.

Institute is Popular.
Paynesville, Minn., Feb. 27.—The State Farmers' Institute, under the charge of W. W. P. McConnell of Mankato, which was held in this village yesterday, was a complete success. Fully 300 farmers were in attendance.

Crushed to Death.
Kelliber, Feb. 27.—William Thompson, a Finlander employed in a logging camp operated by the firm of Ross & Ross, three miles from this village, was hit by the limb of a falling tree yesterday and instantly killed.

MONTANA NEWS

REFUSES TO SIGN BILL.

Montana Governor Lets It Become Law by Default.

The railroad commission bill will become a law without action by the governor. Gov. Toole announced that he would neither approve nor disapprove the measure, but allow it to become a law five days hence without his signature. He said he did not feel like approving the bill because he had not been given what he terms his constitutional right to appoint three commissioners, but he does not feel like vetoing it because there is general demand for a railroad commission, and the bill does not contain some of the objectionable features of the bill he vetoed two years ago.

The bill names Nate Godfrey of Helena, B. T. Stanton of Bozeman and E. A. Morley of Butte as commissioners. They are to draw salaries of \$4,000 a year, and to have a secretary at \$2,500. They hold until their successors are elected at the next general election in 1908 to take the office. The latter will hold for two, four and six years. The bill is a combination of the national, Wisconsin, Iowa and Texas measures, and confers greater powers on the commission than any of these. The burden of proof as to any unjustness of the commission's decisions is placed on the railroads, and it may go ahead and conduct investigations and alter rates on its own volition, without waiting for complaints to be made. The commission is empowered to co-operate with interstate bodies in conducting investigations, and it may also investigate causes of wrecks where life or property are involved to any great extent.

Commissioners can ride on passes furnished by the railroads when on state business. Gov. Toole also allowed the senate bill repealing the merchants and professional license tax to become a law without his approval. This will deprive the state of about \$40,000 per year revenue.

WAR ON WOLVES.

Big Drive Organized by Montana Farmers.

A gigantic wolf drive is being organized by the farmers in the vicinity of Virginia City who have suffered greatly from the ravages of the animals. Hunters from the Dakotas and Wyoming are coming to take part in the drive, and it is expected that the wolves will be pretty well wiped out.

The stock growers of Northern Montana have organized an association to protect themselves against wolves and announce that they will pay a bounty of \$20 per head for the scalps of female wolves and \$10 for full grown wolves and \$2 for pups. The wolf bounty commissioners report that some Heave hunters have made more than \$2,000 from the wolf bounties this season.

SHOT AS BURGLAR.

Iowa Man Who Enters Wrong House is Dangerously Wounded.

Fred Elgin, from Iowa, was probably fatally shot while attempting to enter the house of Carl Dolman at Butte, which he had mistaken for his own lodging house. Elgin had entered the hall when Dolman appeared and ordered him to stop. The young fellow paid no attention to the command, but began ascending the stairs. Thinking he was a burglar, Dolman fired, the bullet piercing Elgin's lungs. Dolman, who is an attorney, was arrested, but was released upon his own recognizance.

TO HAVE ELECTRIC ROAD.

Heinze Agrees to Put Up \$125,000 for Butte-Helena Line.

An electric line between the Missouri, Helena and Butte now seems to be a assured fact. More than \$240,000 already has been raised by subscription for the project, and within a day or two the Helena & Butte Electric Railway company will be incorporated. Its capital stock will be placed at \$250,000 for carrying on the preliminary work, and this later will be increased. F. Augustus Heinze has agreed to subscribe for \$125,000 of the preliminary stock, the balance being taken by citizens of Helena and Butte.

ON HUNT FOR HUSBAND.

Mrs. Minnie Star of St. Charles, Minn., is in Montana.

On a thus far fruitless search for her errant husband, Mrs. Minnie Sta, who says her home is in St. Charles, Minn., was in Billings recently. According to Mrs. Star, her husband left home suddenly without money, about a year ago. She has heard of him two or three times in Minnesota and Montana, but never has been able to locate him definitely. The woman says that her folks are wealthy and prominent people in Minnesota. She declares she will never cease her quest until she finds her husband dead or alive.

Notice was served on all employers of a raise in the scale by the Butte Workmen's union. This organization is the largest in Butte outside of the mining trades, and its members have been getting \$3 a day. Their new scale, which will take effect March 1, calls for \$3.50 a day. Many employers will refuse the demands.

The Butte Business Men's association has empowered its executive board officially to resist the general demands for higher wages.

A shut down would cut 20,000 men off the payrolls. The Amalgamated Copper company pays \$2,000,000 per month to its Montana employees, and a strike of the miners would paralyze industry.
