

RUSH CITY, MINN., SWEEP BY FLAMES

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE WIPES OUT BIG PORTION OF THE TOWN.

LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$200,000

BUSINESS BLOCKS, INCLUDING LIGHT PLANT AND POST-OFFICE, BURNED.

Rush City, Minn., May 14. — Fire originated in the Johnson block at 11 o'clock last night and destroyed it, together with one or two buildings of lesser value and importance.

Rush City is a village of 1,200 people, and for a time it was feared the entire community would be wiped out.

The estimate of the loss is \$200,000. The Johnson block contained two banks, the Rush City State bank and the First National. It also contained the electric light plant, two telephone offices, the offices of many professional men and some stores. The Johnson block was the principal business structure of the village.

The local fire department, assisted by the people generally, succeeded after a long hard fight in getting the fire under control. People of the village had retired for the night when the fire alarm was given. There were no casualties as far as can be learned.

DUEL IN MINING CAMP.

Winfield Guthrie Is Shot Dead by George Melville.

Helena, Mont., May 14.—Meager details have been received here of a fatal quarrel between two well known mining men operating in the Bald Butte district, about thirty miles west of Helena, in the heart of the Rocky mountains.

It is stated that Winfield Guthrie had a dispute with the wife of George Melville. Melville was advised of the affair and securing a gun started in quest of his man. They met in the center of the mining camp, and a fusillade began which resulted in the killing of Guthrie by Melville.

PRIZE FIGHT STOPPED.

Officers Appear at the Ring Side at Fargo.

Fargo, N. D., May 14.—Chief of Police Wade and Capt. Dahlgren of this city prevented a prize fight near some old warehouses on the West side. Horton Adams, a negro, and Frank O'Hara, white, were to fight for the state championship. The ring was prepared and a crowd assembled when the officers appeared. The same contestants had been warned by Minnesota officials against fighting at Dilworth earlier in the day.

TWO DROWNED IN RIVER.

Third Saved From Similar Fate by Football Star.

La Crosse, Wis., May 14.—Venturing out in a skiff on the Mississippi while 200 people upon the shore watched in awe, the waves lashed to whitecaps by a thirty-mile gale, V. Van Camp and Rosa Wright were drowned, and E. O. Ellsworth, who went with them escaped only by clinging to the capsized boat until George Miller, former University of Wisconsin football star, arrived in a launch and rescued him.

FINDS OLD CHECKS.

Receiver of Defunct Bank Discovers Old Letters.

Seymour, Iowa, May 14.—Letters containing money, checks and drafts, which have lain unopened for years in drawers and pigeonholes, have been discovered by Receiver Fry, in charge of the defunct Farmers and Drivers' bank. Some of them date back as far as six years, and the checks contained in them are too old for collection. Others were signed by persons who have since died or gone out of business.

BURGLARS AT MINOT.

They Break Open Laundry Safe and Take Nearly \$300.

Minot, N. D., May 14.—A gang of professional yegmen robbed the safe in the Minot Steam laundry of nearly \$300. The safe had been blown with nitroglycerin and was completely shattered.

Hurt by Bursting Wheel.

Hudson, Wis., May 14.—Frank Geller, an employe at the Omaha railway shops, was badly injured while operating an emery wheel. The wheel broke and pieces struck him in the chest and arm, inflicting serious wounds.

Killed by Engine.


Mason City, Iowa, May 14.—As H. A. Scott stepped from a passenger train he was struck by a switch engine. Both legs were severed and he died three hours later.

MONTANA NEWS

MAY LYNCH "RUSTLERS."

Revival of Vigilance Committee Considered by Victims of Thieves.

The recent great increase in the price of horses, according to stockmen, have caused horse "rustlers" to become holdier and more numerous than at any time since vigilante days. Some of the heaviest losers by the operations of the thieves are seriously considering the revival of the old-time organization and of going back to the old days and dealing out speedy justice at the end of a rope.

In Lewis and Clark county the depredations of the raiders have been especially bold and a vigorous effort is being made by the authorities to hunt down the gang. Informants charging three men with horse stealing have been placed on the secret docket of the district court, and bench warrants have been issued for their arrest.

Stock growers allege that a number of supposedly well-to-do and honest ranchers have been buying stolen animals and standing in with the thieves. It is said to be a favorite practice of some of these ranchers to secure a bill of sale for a mare that has been running the range for several years, the bill of sale including the colts. In this way they are able in a measure to cover up the horses which they have purchased from the rustlers by claiming them as foals of the mare which they have purchased.

POISON FRUIT TO MURDER GIRL.

Girl Sucks Orange and Is Taken Violently Ill.

What appears to have been a deliberate plot to poison Mabelle Hughes, an employe of the Jordan hotel at Glendive, resulted in the young woman being made seriously but not dangerously ill. When she went to her room in the evening the young woman found an orange lying on her dresser and with a typewritten note saying:

"Dear Mabelle: This is for you and you alone. Eat hearty."

Without any suspicion of danger Miss Hughes began sucking the juice of the orange, continuing until she felt a burning sensation about her lips. She was almost at once taken violently ill and a physician who was summoned pronounced her symptoms those of carbolic acid poisoning. An examination of the remains of the orange showed that the pulp had been completely saturated with the poison, which had been introduced beneath the skin by means of a hypodermic syringe.

Miss Hughes was given prompt medical treatment and soon was pronounced out of danger. Her lips, however, were badly burned and she is still suffering from other effects of the poison.

Suspicion points to a young man who had been paying attention to Miss Hughes, but whose proposal of marriage she had rejected. It is said that the typewriter upon which the note was written has been found, and it is expected that an arrest will follow shortly.

BOY GETS FIFTY YEARS.

Court Merciless to Slayer of Watchman.

Judge Winston, in the district court at Anaconda, has sentenced sixteen-year-old Frank Carpenter to a term of fifty years at hard labor in the Deer Lodge penitentiary for the murder of John Johnson at the Parrott ranch last January.

The jury found the boy guilty of murder in the second degree and recommended him to the mercy of the court. Judge Winston, however, declared that the murder was a most cold-blooded crime and that the verdict should have been murder in the first degree.

Carpenter and another lad of the same age had gone to the ranch for the purpose of burglary. Johnson was a watchman there and the boys decided to get him out of the way. One of them went to his shack and called him out when Carpenter, it is alleged, shot and killed him.

WOULD CLEAR ATTORNEYS.

Referee Makes Report to Montana Supreme Court.

The report of Jesiah Shull, referee, to whom was delegated the duty of taking the testimony in the disbarment proceedings instituted against H. H. Jarsons and S. G. Murray, prominent lawyers of Missoula, alleging wrongful practices, was filed in the supreme court, and it will be given consideration at a date to be fixed later by the court. The findings of the referee are complete exonerations from all charges, and a recommendation for the dismissal of the proceedings. The charges were preferred by the W. H. Smead company and alleged, with malpractice, conspiracy, subornation of perjury and an attempt to commit subornation of perjury in connection with realty transfers.

ROCK CUT HEAD IN TWO.

While at work on the 600-foot level of the St. Lawrence mine Dennis Murphy was caught by a fall of rock which cut off the top of his head and killed him instantly. Murphy was working on the level of the St. Lawrence, in Butte, and was in a stooping position when a huge mass of rock fell from the top of the shaft. It struck him in the back of the head and severed the top of his skull as cleanly as could have been done with a surgeon's saw. He was thirty years old and unmarried.
