Cloudburst Kills Two.

A cloudburst at Beaver, fifty miles southeast of here, killed two men and wrought great damage to property last Saturday night. The two men killed were Jimmie Boland and a man by the name of Quinlan, both of whom were employed in construction work on the Milwaukee. The tents and camps of two of the contractors, Tobin and Gilliland, were demolished and much other property destroyed. J. G. Stuart, a sheep man in that vicinity, lost a considerable number of sheep but we are unable to learn the exact number.

The river was the highest ever known and it is reported that the water was clear up to J. A. Ferris' store in Medora on Monday.

About fifteen feet of the railroad track alongside the Little Missouri river just west of Medora slid out Monday night but no damage resulted to trains as the break was found in time to prevent it.

The storm, which was accompanied by considerable wind, seems to have been purely local, visiting only the vicinity of Beaver, but of course the high water and trouble at Medora was a direct result of it.

Narrow Escape From Drowning.

On Friday night a few of the section men became imbued with the idea that a plunge in Beaver creek at the dam below the depot would result pleasantly and accordingly four of them went in. The first two were good swimmers and desported themselves in the water with ease and no doubt the other two boys, being inexperienced, thought they were touching bottom. Such however, was not the case and when Reuben Beelar, the first one of the last two to enter the water, plunged in he immediately commenced to flounder and sputter and soon sunk from sight. The two good swimmers, Peter Johnson and Helge Jordal, lost no time in going to his rescue and no sooner had they got him safe on shore than the last man, Ben Beelar, tried his fool luck with much more serious results. When he plunged in the boys who could swim were clear on the other side of the creek and had to swim a considerable distance before they could reach him and by the time they got there he had sunk and was as near drowned as he or any other man will ever get and live to tell the tale. However, the heroes rescued him and he owes to them his life and the fact that he is still shoveling dirt for Jim Hill.

Easy For Glendive.

The Glendive boys went down to the little farming hamlet known as Beach last Sunday to show the farmers how to play ball and accomplished their purpose, although it has not yet been shown whether the farmers profited by being shown or not.
