

### ATTEMPTS TO DITCH TRAIN

WRECKER AT MOORHEAD, MINN. THROWS GREAT NORTHERN SWITCH.

Moorhead, Minn., Oct. 25.—The Oriental Limited, the Great Northern coast train, which left St. Paul Wednesday morning, was wrecked at this place at 6:30 last evening.

The engine, mail car, baggage car and smoker had passed over the Eighth street switch when an unknown person was seen to throw the switch, throwing the day coach, colonists' sleeper and front trucks of the dining car from the track.

The train was just pulling out of the depot, so it fortunately had gained little speed and was quickly stopped. Outside of a general shaking up, no one was injured. The equipment was badly damaged and the track torn up for a considerable distance, causing several hours' delay.

YOUNG'S CASE UP.

Habeas Corpus Proceedings Begun in Supreme Court.

Washington, Oct. 25.—Thomas D. O'Brien, special counsel for Minnesota, and Assistant Attorney General George T. Simpson reached Washington yesterday and began habeas corpus proceedings which, if successful, will result in a review by the supreme court of the United States of the injunction and contempt order against Attorney General Young of that state, issued two days ago by United States District Judge Lochren.

The brief for the attorney general has been put in the hands of the printer here and is expected to be ready for submission to the court Friday, when formal application for habeas corpus will be made to the court by motion.


