1907 A RED LETTER YEAR.

Right to Vote Won by Women in Four Countries of Europe.

Women all over the world are beginning to look upon 1907 as a red letter year for their sex. Their first notable step ahead this year was the granting of parliamentary suffrage to the women of Norway. Then Swedish women were made eligible for municipal office; next came the granting to the women of Denmark of the right to vote for and serve as members of boards of public charities, and now the British parliament has just passed the bill making women eligible as town and county councilors and aldermen.

In 1888 when the county councils were instituted in England it was thought that women were eligible, and three—Lady Margaret Sandhurst, Miss Jane Cobden and Miss Cons—were elected by the voters of London. Beresford Hope, who had been defeated by Lady Sandhurst, contested the election on the ground that women were not eligible. The litigation was prolonged and meanwhile the women were allowed to serve. One of the duties assigned to Lady Sandhurst was the supervision of twenty-three infant asylums. When Mr. Hope finally succeeded in ousting her one of the leading London dailies sarcastically remarked:

"It is to be hoped that the gentleman will find himself equal to mothering all those babies."

TENDERFOOT KILLS LION.

Man From Michigan, Hunting Prtridges, Brings Down a Big Cat.

A tyro is almost certain to get the real experience. At least James Bullard, a recent arrival in this state from Detroit, Mich., thinks so. Chicken or grouse were the game he sought. He went along Vermillion creek, carrying a shotgun and accompanied by a small dog. He returned with the hide of a large mountain lion as a trophy. It was his first hunting experience in Montana and a most novel one. Bullard was a real tenderfoot, and his experience, as related by him, follows:

He was walking along leisurely, gun over his shoulder and the dog running along ahead, when suddenly a big animal jumped out from a clump of bushes into the road, and, seeing Bullard, made another leap into a near by tree, as if to secure a good position from which to spring upon him. The road was narrow, creek on one side and mountain on the other.

He quickly changed his birdshot shell for one containing buckshot, and they stood facing one another for an instant. Thinking that his revolver might come in handy as a last resort, Bullard dropped it at his feet. He said:

"I never could have killed that animal with the revolver unless I could have pushed it into his mouth. I wanted to run, but I could not, and how I managed to kill the animal with that one charge is more than I know. Whether he was leaping or about to leap is still a mystery in my mind. I was certainly scared. I had never seen a mountain lion before, but I knew I had to take a chance or run, and there was not much show for me to do the latter. Well, I shot and here is the hide. I killed the lion with the first shot, and I have brought the skin in to get the bounty. I was lucky, I guess; that's the way I look at it."

And the bystanders thought so, too. It was a magnificent skin, and Bullard will have it cured and mounted as a trophy of his experience in hunting. Then it will be sent to relatives in Detroit for a Christmas gift. Old hunters consider the feat a marvelous one, for it is no easy matter to slay this dangerous animal, even with a rifle.

ORAM'S BODY HAD 20 WOUNDS.

Minnesota Grader Murdered in Montana.

The body of T. O. Oram of Cokato, Minn., who was foully murdered near Stanford a few days ago, has been sent back to his old home.

Oram was employed as a grader at the camp of Grant & Co., some distance from Stanford and near the Cascade county line. He had been saving money and was expecting his wife to join him. Lately he had been sick and was in the hospital for a few days. He left there one afternoon and started back to camp, intending to go on to Great Falls. The next seen of him was when some other graders found his body lying in a deep cut. It has been there all night, and an examination showed that he had been beaten and stabbed to death, there being no less than twenty cuts on his body.

Oram was a man of excellent habits and was well liked by his employers and the workmen, all looking up to him, and the discovery caused the greatest indignation.

The deputy sheriff at Stanford was put in charge of the case, while Sheriff Edward Martin was speeding to the scene in an automobile. He has established the fact that Oram was assaulted by two men, and the object was robbery. Oram's money and jewelry being missing. The sheriff proposes to stay on the trail until he has some tangible clue, and County Attorney Ayres is giving his personal attention to the case.

It is believed that the butchery was committed by some men who have been with the grading camps, as there are many tough characters in these gangs, which have been assembled from all parts of the East. Oram's mother resides at Saskatchewan, Canada.

HAS DIVORCE RECORD.

For Every 100 Marriages There Are 35 Suits.

According to the figures of Henry F. Starkweather, special agent of the bureau of the census at Washington, Flathead county, Montana, holds the record among all the counties in the Western state where statistics have been secured for the greatest percentage of divorces to marriages. The records of Flathead county show that in the last twenty years, 1,194 marriage licenses have been issued and 419 applications for divorce made; that is, there have been no less than thirty-five applications for divorces out of every hundred marriage licenses filed.

Call Wire Strike Off.

The Anaconda Telegraphers' union, with which Butte is affiliated, decided to call the strike off and return to work. There are sixteen operators in Butte and Anaconda, including the Associated Press operators, who have asked for reinstatement.

The Western Union has opened its office in Great Falls and Billings.

Lieut. Gen. Sir Ian Hamilton, commander of the southern military district of England, has been promoted to a full generalship.

OLD MISER DIES IN ROAD

STARVATION AND EXHAUSTION CAUSES DEATH—\$15,000 ON PERSON.

Jamestown, N. D., Oct. 30.—Starvation, exposure and exhaustion caused the death of John Mooney, a wealthy but miserly land owner of Stutsman county, who was found dead yesterday beside a non-frequented road fourteen miles northwest of Jamestown. Upon his person was found certificates of deposit representing \$15,000.

Mooney was seen alive last when visiting the farm house of a renter on one of his own farms. He left there in the evening and was returning to his house when, overcome by weakness about a quarter of a mile from the house, he lay down near the side of the road and there miserably expired. When found the body was lying flat on its back.

John Mooney was a well-known character in Stutsman and Sheldon counties, noted for his wealth and extreme penuriousness. He came in the pioneer days to Sheldon, working on the Fargo & Southwestern railway as a section laborer and there he got his start, saving nearly every cent he earned.

Later he came to Jamestown and accumulated money and land in the county, shrewd investments in mortgages bringing profits, but his expenses were on an inverse ratio to his income.

He spent last winter in a room over a store of this city and boasted that his expenses for food were less than 10 cents a day.

Besides bank deposits, Mooney owned nearly 1,000 acres of valuable land in Stutsman county.

GRAIN MEN USE CHECK PLAN.

Will Send No Money to Elevators in the Country—Plan Used Before.

Minneapolis, Oct. 31.—Minneapolis elevator and grain men met yesterday morning for a conference on the present financial situation. It was decided to adopt the certificate plan in dealing with interior elevators, and no cash will be sent out to the country grain men except where absolutely necessary.

The plan as outlined for the care of the interior elevator business is similar to that which is now in vogue in this city. There will be no cash handled at the different elevator points. The large elevators will send checks to their representatives which can be deposited with the local banks to their credit. Farmers who come with their grain will be paid in checks which the local bank will handle and send to the Minneapolis banks to be charged up against the grain companies who drew them.

This plan has been worked before. It was tried several years ago in a period of tight money and aided in relieving the situation. The bankers and grain firms are sending out circulars to country points explaining the move.

CAVALRY MARCHES ON UTES.

Truce Declared While Indians Lay Grievances Before President.

Forest City, S. D., Oct. 31.—With four troops of cavalry from Fort Des Moines on the Cheyenne reservation, one stationed at the agency and the remainder moving westward slowly, all fear of trouble with the rebellious Ute Indians has been allayed and civilians sent to the relief of Capt. Downs are returning.

In addition the Indians in council have promised to cause no disturbance while representatives of the tribe are sent to Washington to lay their grievances before the president.

WOMAN FATALLY BURNED.

Mrs. Charles Lindstrom of Balsam Victim of Accident.

Amery, Wis., Oct. 31.—Mrs. Charles Lindstrom, eighty years old, was fatally burned at her home in the town of Balsam Lake Monday night. After retiring she got up to replenish the fire, and her night clothes caught fire, burning her fearfully before the flames could be extinguished. She died yesterday morning.

FIRE SWEEPS PRAIRIE.

Crosses From South Dakota Into Minnesota.

St. Paul, Oct. 31.—A prairie fire in Lac qui Parle county which had its origin across the line in South Dakota, has been reported to Gen. C. C. Andrews, state forestry commissioner. The fire occurred on Oct. 21 and burned over several hundred acres, destroying some corn and thousands of tons of hay and straw.

Iowa Motorman Loses His Life.

Waterloo, Iowa, Oct. 31.—R. G. Stallnecker, a motorman on the Waterloo, Cedar Falls & Northern street railway, was killed last night in a collision with an Illinois Central passenger train while running the car across the tracks.

Runaway May Prove Fatal.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Oct. 31.—Charles Kersten, a pioneer resident of the southern part of Miner county, was fatally injured as the result of a runaway accident.

Entry may now be made before the Agent or Sub-Agent of the District, by mail, for certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

"Any green numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North West Provinces, excepting 1 and 2, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the son of a family, of male over 18 years of age, who has been a quarter section of 160 acres, more or less."
