Miles City Foot Ball Team No Match For Wibaux's Team

Local High Outclasses Veterans from Custer

Old King Pluvius got busy with his sprinkling can last Saturday and tried to settle the dust, but Wibaux High went him one better by proving so hot for Miles City that by the time the game was over Miles was in the dust to the tune of 25 to 13.

The score, however, does not tell all—it gives no idea of the chagrin felt by Miles City at being defeated by Wibaux, a town of which many of the visiting players had never heard till this fall. Some of them volunteered this information, but it is safe to say the W. H. S. foot ball team will not soon be forgotten by them.

Neither does the score record the tremendous enthusiasm of the crowd of rooters that witnessed the contest; neither does it tell of the remarkable playing of the local high school boys. Only those present at the game can realize these things.

For the locals, Capt. Orgain and Chappell played a brilliant game. Their tackling was deadly and they advanced the ball at will. Following closely on their heels for honors were K. Orgain, Trotter, Yaden, and Carlson. In fact, the whole team are worthy of being in the limelight. Trotter lived up to his name and turkey-trotted the ball up and down the gridiron.

The way Carlson tore up the opposing offense made one think of his Norse ancestors. He, along with Anderson, his twin mate tackle, made Custer hurry so fast that they never even got started. Shike, Wibaux's star quarter, showed that not even a bloody nose could stop his fighting ability. Hafner made one think of an immense German army driving the enemy before him. James proved an outlaw to the Custer bunch. Yaden at center showed what he could do when once he got aroused from his lethargy. The two guards, the one playing his first game, proved themselves heroes worthy of the iron cross.

Taking all in all, Wibaux showed some of the best come-back spirit ever seen on the gridiron. Miles City was outplayed from the start, but, nevertheless put up a game fight.

For the visitors, Captain Ammon was the best ground gainer and Woodward punted better than any other player ever seen on the local field.

The game started well for locals, Chappell having kicked to Custer's 40-yard line, where Wibaux recovered the ball on a fumble. In a few rushes they were up on the 1-yard line. There they were held for downs. Custer kicked to the 50-yard line. Capt. Orgain caught the ball and returned it ten yards. On the next play Trotter took it up to the 5-yard line. In a few rushes a touch-down was scored. Chappell kicked goal from a very difficult angle.

Play was resumed by Wibaux receiving the kick. After fighting gamely up hill to the middle of the field, the locals lost the ball. By a shift,

In a few minutes Wibaux was marching for another touchdown. It came when Chappell, the new White Hope, hurled his burly frame thru the opposing line. Score, 25 to 7.

Near the end of the game Miles scored her second touchdown on a 60-yard run. The referee had blown his whistle and the locals, knowing the ball was dead, did not hinder the Miles City runner. The visitors were allowed the touchdown.

With but three more minutes to play Wibaux rushed the ball from their own 20-yard line to Custer's 30-yard line on forward passes and line plunges. With but one-half minute to play, a long forward pass was made but hit the ground on the goal line. The final whistle blew announcing the end of the game.

The smoke cleared away, the dust settled and Wibaux High School sat astride Custer's neck.
