The State Convention.

In addition to the telegram published in last week's issue partially reporting the result of the state convention it may be stated that W. H. Hunt received the nomination for associate justice on the first ballot, that Meagher county paid a debt of gratitude in this ballot by delivering her whole vote to Harwood; that it appears somewhat probable that if Hunt had not been elected on the first ballot he would not have been the choice; it was a complimentary vote that carried him through.

The convention was a season of great spiritual ingathering. Col. Plummer, of Minot, N. D., was called for in the last hour, responding in one of the most thoroughly fitting stump speeches ever given in Montana. He is up to snuff on all occasions and keeps his house in a roar of laughter. After he had concluded his remarks the convention forgot to adjourn, but just went away.

THE PLATFORM.

The Republicans of the State of Montana proclaim their fidelity to the time-honored principles, policies and traditions of the republican party of the United States that have manifested their wisdom and beneficence in the preservation of the Union, the honor of the Republic and the happiness and prosperity of all classes of citizens.

We declare our renewed and increased allegiance and devotion to the principle of protection to American labor to the end that the home market may be preserved for its products, that the American standard of wages may be maintained, and that our workmen may so share in the fruits of their toil as to be safe and worthy depositories of the privileges and responsibilities of American citizenship.

We denounce the tariff law passed by the present Democratic Congress as a monstrosity that can be reconciled to no principle of economic science and can lead to no consequence but disaster. We condemn especially the ruin which it inflicts upon the wool-growing industry, the denial of adequate protection to barley and the sectional spirit which it displays in its assaults upon northern and western interests.

We especially denounce the hostile attitude of the Democratic party toward the wool interest of the United States, whereby one of the principal industries of Montana has been ruined and those engaged in it bankrupted by the depreciation in the value of all their property and products to the extent of more than one-half, and the consequent loss to the state of millions of dollars.

We approve of the policy of reciprocity which had its origin in the genius of James G. Blaine and its fruition in the enlargement of foreign markets for the products of our industries and the establishment of closer relations with friendly powers on a basis of mutual advantage.

We invite attention to the contrast between the content and the prosperity of the American people under the influence of Republican legislation and administration, and the conditions of hardship, distress and disorder that have resulted from eighteen months of Democratic rule; and we call upon the citizens of Montana to arise above the prejudices of partisanship and join us on the platform of a common patriotism in the redemption of the land from ruin and the restoration of its welfare.

We believe that the consistent application of the principle of protection requires the regulation of imported persons as well as imported products, and that the time has now come when we should enact vigorous measures of legislations to prevent the incursions of underpaid and ignorant laborers from the world, and so reconstruct our laws respecting naturalization as to place additional safeguards around American citizenship.

We demand the strict enforcement of the law for the exclusion of Chinese from our shores, and denounce the action of the President in practically nullifying this wholesome legislation by treaties with the government of China.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of silver at a ratio of sixteen to one, and the making of silver as well as gold a legal tender in payment of all debts, both public and private; and we pledge our Senators and Representative in Congress to the support of the policy expressed in this resolutions, irrespective of the action of Republican members from other sections of the Union. We further demand that this policy shall be established forthwith by the independent action of our Government regardless of what any other country may or may not do.

We hereby pledge all Republican candidates for the legislature, if elected to vote only for such candidates for the United States Senate as are known from their record and passed utterances to be uncompromisingly in favor of such free coinage.

We denounce the action of the President of the United States in failing to execute for the period of four months before its repeal the provisions of the Sherman act requiring the purchase of four and one half million ounces of silver per month as a flagrant violation of his duties and a usurpation of legislative authority.

We are opposed to all trusts and combinations that seek to control the production, or enhance the cost of commodities. We arraign the Democratic administration for its shameful failure to enforce the law for their suppression which was enacted by a Republican Congress and signed by a Republican President. We view with unqualified condemnation the flagrant favoritism manifested by the present Democratic Congress toward the sugar trust by increasing the necessary expenses of every household in the land by forced contributions to its extortionate profits; the legislation that enables the lead trust to depreciate the output of our mines and at the same time increase the cost of its product to the consumer, and the provisions of the tariff bill that have resulted in enormous gains to the whisky trust and the expense of the treasury of the United States.

We recognize with a feeling of gratitude that time cannot abate, the services and sacrifices of the heroic defenders of the Union and its flag; and favor the granting of liberal pensions to all soldiers and sailors who are entitled thereto by reason of their disabilities or necessities.

We welcome the Republic of Hawaii to the sisterhood of nations, and we declare our conviction that the action of the present Democratic administration in seeking to restore to power over the people of those islands a despotic and semi-barbarous dynasty was repulsive to every truly American sentiment.

We recognize the right of all classes of laboring men to organize for the purpose of using all lawful and peaceable means to protect their rights, improve their condition and place labor on an equal footing with capital; and we approve the establishment of tribunals of arbitration and conciliation whereby differences between employers and employes may be settled and adjusted without strikes or lockouts.

The maintenance of public order is the first duty of good citizenship, and this to be accomplished by wise laws which shall so hedge around every man in his immutable rights and privileges as that none shall feel that the state is indifferent to welfare or heedless of his just complaint; to diligent service in the redress of all evils which come within the domain of political correction.

We favor the adoption by the nation and the state of a liberal and comprehensive policy for the reclamation of our arid lands, with such provisions as shall afford effectual safeguards against monopolies of the soil or of the water necessary to its useful cultivation.

We recommend the further elimination of Indian reservations from the map of this state, and believe the time is now at hand when every Indian should have and be required to live on his allotted farm, and that all other lands, with their vast mineral, agricultural and pastoral wealth should be opened to the occupation and uses of civilized man.

We congratulate the people of Montana upon the decision rendered by the supreme court of the United States affirming their right to the mineral lands within the grant to the Northern Pacific railroad, and we denounce the action of the Interior Department in the adoption of regulations manifestly prejudicial to the enjoyment of the rights which have been thus judicially established.

We demand that the youth of Montana shall receive, free of cost, the inestimable blessings of an education that shall fit them to wear the crown of American sovereignty.

We express our enthusiastic approbation of the diligence, zeal and fidelity of Hon. Thomas C. Power and Hon. Charles S. Hartman, our Senator and Representative in Congress, in guarding and promoting the interests of Montana, representing with unswerving duty the great patriotic and beneficent principles of the Republican party.

We endorse the administration of Hon. John E. Rickards, Governor of Montana, and commend especially the firmness with which he protected the state from the shame and disgrace of a special session of the third legislative assembly.

We denounce as unworthy of confidence those Republican members of the legislative assembly who betrayed their party principles and party associates by casting their votes in Senatorial election for a Democrat who has ever been first and foremost in opposition to Republicans and Republican principles. And we further express our contempt for any man who, to gratify his ambition for office, seeks by bribery and corruption to accomplish his desires.

The Republican party is fitted by qualities and history for the era upon which it has now fallen, in which new issues have been projected for discussion and determination. Originally organized to limit in the United States the spread of human slavery, it has seized and determined with wise discretion every new question which during its supremacy has arisen with a courage and moderation which has exalted the homage of patriotism and given it unfading renown. It asserted and augmented the dignity and rewards of labor. It maintained the unity of the republic in peace and war. It summoned the economic and physical forces of the country for the greatest struggle in human history, and when it ended remitted those forces to normal conditions with a wisdom and moderation which is the admiration of mankind.

It diversified industries of the country by a wise system of levying duties upon imports until labor was everywhere demanded and in every avocation adequately remunerated. It bound the continent together with bands of steel, gave to each toiler a home, founded states, and in behalf of human freedom and Republican institutions set a commanding example to all the nations of the world. It is ready with conservative vigor to examine and determine the new questions which arise in the evolution of our monetary, economic and industrial life, and making sure of the good already achieved, will march forward on its beneficent

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
