Great Amount of Labor In Equipping Voting Precincts.

Very few people have an idea of the great amount of labor necessitated by the approach of a presidential election or the supplies which are be furnished for poultry feed. urnished the different election boards throughout the county by the county

To commence with the auditor must prepare a copy of the official ballot and see that it is correct in every name, and when it is considered that the ticket which will be presented for the consideration of the voters of Flathcad county gives the names of candidates on eight different party tickets some idea is gained of the work in preparing such a list for pub-

After the ballots have been printed they must be counted and two ballots for every lega, voter rolled and placed in a sealed package together with an official check list. Two poll books, two tally sheets, in structions to voters, a copy of the election laws, a list of registrations surrendered, affidavits of objections to voters, a list of persons challenged pens, ink, pencils, rubber stamps, ink pads, needle and thread, with which to string the ballots after being count-

There are twenty-eight voting precincts in the county, the farthest distant being Silvynite, over 130 miles away and Dermarsville, the nearest, but three miles from the city. After all the packages have been prepared for each precinct they must be forwarded without delay and in many cases by special messengers to the voting places.
