## All Hallow's Day.

Today is All Hallow's Day, on the  
eve of which supernatural influences  
were supposed to prevail, and as the  
night which was set apart for a uni-  
versal walking abroad of spirits both  
of the visible and the invisible world:  
for on the eve of all Hallow's day

brought up to the question, "Don't  
you think such action on the part of  
Clark contemptible?" he had noth-  
ing to say other than that perhaps  
that was true. Nickerson would have  
done the boodle gang far more good  
had he remained away from Kalis-  
pell.

## NEW BOOKS.

Selection To Be Made and Purchases  
For the Library Will Follow.

At the meeting of the Library asso-  
ciation a report of the receipts from  
the harvest ball was made showing  
that almost \$165 had been placed to  
the credit of the association. The  
librarian also made a report of the  
number of books loaned and other  
information usual in such reports. One  
noticeable thing in connection with  
the statement of books loaned was  
the fact that during the month more  
books of travel and history were read  
than at any time in the past.

A committee composed of Mrs. A.  
L. Gray, Mrs. James Conlon and  
Mrs. George Phillips will prepare a  
list of books and expend \$125 in their  
purchase. The balance of the fund  
will be expended for the same pur-  
pose about the first of the year.

It was decided to give another en-  
tertainment early next year to raise  
additional funds for the library.

## OFFICIAL BALLOTS.

Great Amount of Labor in Equip-  
ping Voting Precincts.

Very few people have an idea of  
the great amount of labor necessitat-  
ed by the approach of a presidential  
election or the supplies which are  
furnished the different election boards  
throughout the county by the county  
authorities.

To commence with the auditor must  
prepare a copy of the official ballot  
and see that it is correct in every  
name, and when it is considered that  
the ticket which will be presented  
for the consideration of the voters  
of Flathead county gives the names of  
candidates on eight different party  
tickets some idea is gained of the  
work in preparing such a list for pub-  
lication.

After the ballots have been print-  
ed they must be counted and two  
ballots for every legal voter rolled  
and placed in a sealed package to-  
gether with an official check list.  
Two poll books, two tally sheets, in-  
structions to voters, a copy of the  
election laws, a list of registrations  
surrendered, affidavits of objections  
to voters, a list of persons challenged  
pens, ink, pencils, rubber stamps, ink  
pads, needle and thread, with which  
to string the ballots after being count-

ed, blotters, tacks, paper seals, bill  
heads, large and small envelopes and  
the ballot boxes.

There are twenty-eight voting pre-  
cincts in the county, the farthest dis-  
tant being Silvynite, over 130 miles  
away and Demersville, the nearest,  
but three miles from the city. Af-  
ter all the packages have been pre-  
pared for each precinct they must be  
forwarded without delay and in many  
cases by special messengers to the  
voting places. In considering the  
fact that all this work had been done  
in the office of the county auditor  
during the past few days, none can  
find fault if they have thought that  
they were not given as much atten-  
tion as in the past, when transac-  
ing business in that office.
