A steam shovel which will be used in grading south of the city arrived in this city Saturday.

The surveyors and engineers employed on the southern extension have rented an office in the Conrad block.

A number of stables are being erected on the west side of town by contractors, in which to keep their live stock.

There was an exciting game of football Sunday afternoon between picked elevens, near the ice house, north of the railroad.

The southern branch will leave the main line, running south near the brick yard and pass through the grounds of the company.

A steam pile driver will be put to work during the present week, near the brick yard, west of the city, where the line crosses Ashley creek.

The teams which have been brought from Fort Benton to be used in grading, are without exception in good condition and attracted much attention owing to their fine appearance.

A large force of men were grading near the point where the branch line running to the lake will leave the main line of the Great Northern Saturday. It is expected that they will have the connection made Tuesday night.

Mares brothers, of Helena, who have purchased each year a number of Buffalo from the Allard herd on the Flathead Indian reservation, have bought 14 head this year to be killed for the holiday trade. One of those killed by this firm last year is said to be one of the finest specimens of the almost extinct species and will be placed on exhibit at the Pan-American exposition.

Twelve car loads of ties which will be used on the new railroad have arrived in the local yards of the Great Northern. They are a part of a consignment of twenty-five thousand which will be used.

The funeral of John M. Foy who was killed last Wednesday morning, occurred yesterday. The funeral was from the residence of Lou Schaffer and interment was in the Demersville cemetery. The funeral was one of the largest seen in the county.

**DISTRICT COURT.**

Patton, the Murderer, Davis Bros. and Other Criminals up.

A good look at the bunch of fellows who were lined up in front of Judge Smith yesterday afternoon in the district court room did not demonstrate that there were many redeeming features among the entire lot, other than the fact that they had made a successful effort to make themselves personally presentable. Long confinement has commenced to tell on everyone of them and as they stood facing the judge when the charges were read against them, their pale faces were generally spoken of.

James Patton, who is charged with having murdered Carroll near Big Fork on the night of Oct. 15, was much paler than when last seen in public, but his voice was firm, and other than a scarcely noticeable nervous movement of his hands he gave no sign that the charge of murder affected him in any way. He stated that he was without funds at the present time at his request Judge Smith appointed T. D. Long to defend him. A plea in answer to the charges will be entered at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

The Davis brothers, George and John, who came near putting Officer Hannah out of business on the morning of October 4, slouched up against two chairs during the reading of the charges against them and answered each question of the court in unison. They stated that T. D. Long was their attorney, and he entered their plea of not guilty.

William Casey who is charged with having stolen \$18 at the Union house in this city, on August 6, was out of luck and funds and his honor appointed Attorney Noffsinger to defend him.

John Powell, alias Charles Middleton, and Joe Godson, alleged forgers of checks drawn in their favor and signed by L. Tinkle, and who successfully passed three of them September 29, braced up and stated that didn't have a "red." Attorneys Pomeroy and Brennen will look after their interests.

**CITY COUNCIL.**

Regular Meeting—New Sewers, Water Mains and Bills Allowed.

The city council met in regular session last night and transacted the usual monthly business. New water mains will be laid, sidewalks put in and sewer contracts let, in different parts of the city.

Petitions requesting extensions of water mains south from Second street on Fifth avenue south for four blocks and from Fifth street to Sixth street on First street west, and Seventh avenue and a sewer in the alley between Seventh and Eighth street, and Sixth and Seventh avenues east, and their request be granted.

The city treasurer's report shows that there is a balance of \$1,784.39 on hand. The chief of police reported 48 arrests for offenses against the city and 22 against the state. The street commissioners had expended \$179.98, and the police judge reported having collected from fines \$413.00 during October.

Building permits were granted Al Cassin L. Woll, B. Streater, E. A. Walker, Curtis and Main, and Gee Chung, all desiring to construct buildings in the city.
