ARRESTED AT SPOKANE

For Attempting to Entice Young Girls to Life of Shame.

Andrew Hendrickson and Minnie Joyce, supposed to be the keepers of one of the numerous dance halls along the line of the Columbia Falls cut-off, were arrested in Spokane last week, charged with attempting to induce girls under 18 years of age to enter a disorderly house. They are being held under \$1,000 bonds and will have their trial before the superior court of Spokane county. When first arrested Hendrickson and the Joyce woman claimed to be husband and wife, but afterwards the latter denied this and gave her name. The couple had been in Spokane for several days and by their stories of easy money to be made from the loggers, miners and railroad men that frequented their resort, they had induced three young girls to consent to return with them to this county. On the night set for their departure from Spokane the officers there became suspicious and the party were arrested at the depot just before the departure of the train for Kalispell. The girls were told that they would get a percentage on all drinks they sold and would have their rooms free. They would have to pay for their laundry and board, but would have a chance to make all the side money they wanted. Alfred Hawkins, a cook, and J. B. Miller, an employment agent, were placed under arrest charged with complicity in the affair, and all will have to stand trial. In default of bail Hawkins and the Joyce woman are behind the bars and Miller and Hendrickson are out on \$1,500 bonds, while Irene Howard, May Vanham and Lulu Dugan, the three girls, are held as witnesses.

Hendrickson and Minnie Joyce are unknown to the police of the city, but they are believed to be among the army of dance hall keepers who flocked into this county with the commencement of the construction work and who make their living by preying upon the ignorant workmen. There are numerous dives along the cut-off between Columbia Falls and Rexford where the laborers are relieved of their wages by the aid of a boozey "fairy" and a fiddle. When the charms of the women are on the wane a new supply is secured from nearby cities. It is this kind of a place that Hendrickson is supposed to run, but as the Spokane authorities seem determined to give him all that is coming to him, it will probably be some time before he will be able to return to his old stamping grounds.

The county commissioners met in special session this morning to approve the bonds of newly appointed officers and to sign various contracts.

William Boyes, who has been in the city for several weeks receiving treatment for a badly shattered hand, the result of a gunshot wound, returned to his home in Libby this week.

The new power plant of the Kalispell Flour Mill company is rapidly nearing completion and the change will be made from electricity to steam by the first of the new year.

Almost sixty scholars took the Eighth grade examination for promotion to the county high school held last week, but it will be some time before the names of the successful ones will be announced. The delay is due to the great number of papers to be examined by the county.

George O'Brien was removed from the hospital to the county jail Saturday, where he will remain until his trial at the next term of court. Mrs. O'Brien was unable to pay for the services of one guard and as the county commissioners would not pay for both night and day watchers the prisoner was taken back to jail. While awaiting trial a male nurse will be employed to watch over him in order to prevent a recurrence of the deadly sickness from which he suffered before being taken to the hospital.

Although he was known to be in Butte last week the officers of that city have not been able to round him up, even with the aid of a description furnished by the authorities here. From the fact that no trace of the horse he stole has been found in the smoky city the officers are of the opinion that he sold it somewhere between Missoula and Butte, and with the proceeds succeeded in getting further away. The chances for his capture are slim, and he is by this time beyond the reach of the local officers. Steps are being taken to find the stolen animal with fair chances of success.

THE NEW STATE SONG.

Publishers Favor the Bee With a copy of "Montana."

The Bee has received a copy of the state song, for which a prize of \$50 was given by the Reeves Music House during the state fair. The music is by Gustav Fischer, an Anaconda violinist, and the words by Mrs. Knapp of Missoula, who is president of the Women's Literary club of Missoula. She was a former resident of Ann Arbor, Mich., where she taught Latin and rhetoric.

The words were written and appeared in one of the Montana dailies before it was known a prize was to be offered. When it was announced that an award would be given, Mr. Fischer put the words to music without the knowledge of the author, and in this way the collaboration took place. The author and composer have never met and are not acquainted with each other. The prize was divided between them.
