**ONE MORE JAP DEAD**

**Killed In A Bunk Car At Browning.**

**A PECULIAR ACCIDENT**

**Pile of Bedding, Japs, Wood and a Stove. Too Much For The Man From Japan.**

A peculiar accident occurred at Browning yesterday morning, which resulted in the death of one of the Japanese employes of the Great Northern. Just how the man was caught and killed is not known, but from most reliable sources it is stated that he was crushed and burned to death under a stove and falling timber in a bunk car, which had been struck by a number of freight cars run in on a switch.

The living cars were occupied by a number of Japs when it was struck. Japs, bunks, bedding, stove and wood were piled up together, and when the wreckage was cleared away it was discovered that the Jap had been killed. He was brought to this city yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock on No. 15 and will be buried here.

This is the first Jap to be killed in over two months on this division of the Great Northern.

**JUMPED THE QUARANTINE.**

**William Newbower and Wife Receive a Chilling Reception.**

Word has reached this city to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Newbower, two of those who have been suffering with smallpox at Bear Dance, forty miles south of this city, had returned to their home, a short distance below Big Fork.

A quarantine had been declared and they were subject to the laws which cover such a case and notwithstanding the orders of the county health board they left the home of Mr. Cramer and went to their own home, driving the entire distance. Mrs. Newbower is said to have fully recovered, but Newbower was at the stage where the disease is most contagious.

When their neighbors learned that the Newbowers had so little consideration for them and had knowingly returned and endangered them to the disease there was a sort of an indignation meeting. A letter was prepared, and was signed by most of the residents of the east side of the lake, which, in anything but mild language, expressed their thoughts. It is said by one of those who signed the letter that Mr. Newbower was informed that in the future none of those signing would have any use for him, in fact all friendship is at an end.

The county health board have been notified of the breaking of the quarantine and will, as soon as Newbower's health will permit, bring action against him for violating the quarantine regulations. It is said that Mr. and Mrs. Newbower returned to Bear Dance after receiving the letter from their neighbors. That fact, however does not lessen the offense against the health laws and the health authorities will not permit such violations to go unpunished.


