

## MONTANA NEWS.

Helena's townsite embraces about nine square miles.

The advance of the railroad has so enlivened the saloon trade in Helena that old-timers are reminded of the days of '65.

Discouraging reports come back from quite a number who left Montana to work on the Canadian Pacific, work is reported scarce.

The body of a man was seen in the river near Billings on Saturday but disappeared while the discoverer went in search of a coroner.

The contract for the care of the poor of Custer county has been awarded to J. G. Mackenzie, and that for medical attendance to Dr. J. J. Wood.

A Chinaman stole \$800 at Trout creek, Missoula county, recently, and left for San Francisco. He was arrested at Dillon and is now in Deer Lodge jail.

A skating contest in one of the Helena rinks between W. Alexander and J. Reynolds resulted in the latter winning the purse, \$65, by a narrow majority.

A few days ago the dead body of a young and well dressed man was found in the Jocko river, near the third crossing. The feet were tied together with a rope, and a bullet hole through the body told a tale of murder. The body was buried on the bank of the river; name unknown.—Missoula Times.

Twenty-five carloads of cattle passed through Fargo over the Northern Pacific yesterday, en route to the great Montana Stock Company's ranch. It is said that during the present season this company will ship from the east to their stock farm not less than five thousand head of fine cattle.—Fargo Republican, Sunday.

Montana stock growers are buying young cattle in Iowa and Illinois and shipping them out to the bunch grass ranges of the territory by the train load. There is money in this new deal. Yearlings in the prairie states are bought for considerably less than owners are willing to take in Montana. This is already, the present year, quite an item in the transportation receipts of the Northern Pacific. The same stock in two or three years later will go back over the same line of railroad, rolling fat beeves, to supply the markets from near which they came in the first place.

T. J. Lowry tells the story of a freighter who was coming along the road in the Three Forks bottom at the same time the track was being laid. The bottom was almost a sea of mud, and for ten days it was nip and tuck between the freighter and the railroad. Sometimes the freighter was ahead at night, and sometimes it was the railroad. The freighter was almost in despair, thinking the railroad would beat him into Helena, but finally a bridge delayed the tracklayers, the oxen struck solid ground, pulled out, and have reached Helena before the iron horse after all. The Northern Pacific is making giant strides across the continent.—Helena Independent.

Several of Major and Mrs. Maginnis' friends drove to the terminus of the Northern Pacific yesterday to meet the stage and escort them to the city. When the parties met there were hearty greetings to our distinguished delegate and his lady. Delegate Maginnis stands at the head of the territorial delegation in Congress, and has served so well and long in the halls of Congress that Montana is justly proud of her able and eloquent representative. He is always welcomed here most cordially by his constituents, irrespective of party, as he works with an eye single to Montana and the interests of the whole people. Mrs. Maginnis is glad to get back to the mountains and her old friends once more. They are stopping at the Cosmopolitan Hotel.—Independent, 10th.

Dan Costello's circus has left Duluth via the Northern Pacific en route for the Pacific coast. They will travel by special to Mandan, by regular train to Helena, and thence across country in their own wagons. We may expect them in Livingston in a few weeks. Costello's will be the pioneer circus of Montana—a description that will in after years be a proud distinction.
