Capt. Meade, U. S. Deputy Mineral Surveyor, came down river this morning and has been spending the day in town. He reports a steady increase of miners in Emigrant Gulch and neighboring districts. Work on the Park branch is progressing as rapidly as the difficulties of the route will allow. Meade is an old-time type sticker and has worked on several Montana papers, among them, we think, the Yellowstone Journal. He now occupies, if not a more responsible position of public trust, at least a more remunerative one, and is eminently qualified for the position.

The case of the woman whose advertisement for her husband appears elsewhere seems a peculiarly sad one. He left her at Richardson, Dakota, intending to visit this place, and write or telegraph for her to come or stay as he thought most advisable. She waited some weeks, and receiving no word, started and reached here yesterday, and is unable to find any trace of her husband. Without friends of money, and with several small children to support, she finds herself among strangers, in a strange country (they came to Dakota from Australia), and almost hopelessly separated from her husband. She has no thought that he deserted her.

Reported Placer Find.

We mentioned some days ago that a number of miners were prospecting in the foothills across the river, just opposite and south of town. Yesterday several of them were in town and reported striking placer that panned out very rich. They outfitted with supplies and returned to the hills, promising to be in town again in a few days with further particulars. While it is not politic to accept faithfully every item of these mining reports we should not be surprised if this report contains the element of truth. It has long been the opinion of experienced miners, acquainted with this country, that there are placer deposits as well as quartz in the gulches and mountains south of Livingston, and that they would ultimately be discovered and worked as profitably as were the mines of Emigrant Gulch in the earliest days. This strike may now have been made and we await further reports with the greatest interest. Livingston may yet become not merely the center of a great mineral region but a mining camp in itself.
