As we remember the circumstances, Siorburg had been quarreling and fighting with the other occupants of the cabin, all being under the influence of whiskey, and the former had been so severely beaten that he lay down in the bunk. Shortly after, Adolfson went to render him some friendly attention and suddenly seized a knife and cut Siorburg's throat.

Stage Robbery.
About four o'clock on Wednesday the Helena bound Boulder coach was held up by two men with handkerchiefs tied over the faces. The driver and his nine passengers all got down on the ground and held up their hands in the latest and most approved style in obedience to the robbers' orders, enforced by two revolvers. Their pockets were then investigated and a total clean up of \$25 appropriated. There was perhaps \$1,000 in the party but the robbers got into the wrong pockets. The treasure box which they detained had nothing in it but a worthless letter. A reward of \$500 is offered for their capture.
