### MONTANA NEWS.

The Helena and Bozeman base-ball clubs are to play a match game on the 5th of July in Helena.

Benton is bound to have a land office and a custom house if persistent agitation will accomplish it.

J. J. Hill's manufacturing town at the falls of the Missouri, at the mouth of Sun river, is to be called Great Falls.

Helena is having a deluge of snide shows, which make up by high sounding names what they lack in actual worth.

The Billings newspapers are kicking because the road to the Bull mountain coal fields is not likely to start from that town.

Mr. McEvans, owner of a placer mine near Blackfoot, had his leg terribly crushed by a boulder rolling on it last Monday.

Calgary, on the Canadian Pacific, is becoming quite a place. There are already 3,000 people there, and more are flocking in.

Montana, Idaho and Utah have been consolidated into one revenue district and O. J. Hollister, of Salt Lake City, has been appointed collector.

Macon Murphy, a member of the great Wyoming stock firm, Murphy Bros., owning 30,000 head of cattle, died in Miles City on Sunday, of dropsy of the heart.

Coal has never been on sale in Helena but on and after August 1st the Northern Pacific Coal Company will offer this species of fuel for sale in the capital of Montana.

The Northern Pacific track reached Missoula at 3 o'clock p. m. on Saturday. The citizens turned out en masse to see the construction train steam into the depot grounds.

Senator Edmunds, of Vermont, is with Vice President Oakes in the western part of Montana. Distinguished U. S. senators seem to be "catching on" the northwest this season.

A little boy in one of the Benton Sunday schools was asked recently by his teacher why our first parents were driven from the Garden of Eden, and he replied, very innocently, "Because they ate up all of the Lord's canned fruit."

Erie Woods, nineteen years of age, a son of A. J. Woods, who owns a ranch in Graveyard Bottom, was drowned last Friday in a slough near his house. He was subject to epileptic fits, and it is supposed that he fell into the water while suffering from one of these attacks.

The Henry Villard Hydraulic Mining company has contracted to place \$150,000 of its stock with an English syndicate. The proceeds will go to the treasury of the company, and be used as a development fund for putting in the Mill creek ditch. This places this gigantic corporation on its financial feet, and ensures a large mining camp at Chico.

Dillon Tribune advice: Editor Prout, in the last Churchman, appeals to his Episcopal brethren for news and notes to fill up his paper. We do not know much about getting up a religious newspaper, but the way propellers of secular sheets do is to "hop on" to anything that can be worked into a live fill up. It is also a cardinal virtue to do plausible "guessing" in the absence of solid facts.

A railroad workman at Greenhorn Gulch last Tuesday saw something glittering in some sluice boxes under the railroad bridge on which he was working. On going down and making an examination he was a little astonished to find a gold nugget about the size of his fist. He reported the find to the owner of the sluice boxes (Henry D. Evans) who took charge of the prize. It is worth \$500.—Independent.

News was brought into Missoula on the 25th, by an eye-witness, that on Saturday at 6:30 p. m., at Elk creek, one and a half miles east of Heron siding, a wood train, backing down, was run into by a gravel train, instantly killing eighteen Chinamen and wounding from twenty to twenty five others. The engineer of the gravel train was killed and the fireman seriously wounded. No one on the wood train was hurt. The gravel train was going at the rate of thirty-five miles an hour when the collision occurred. Both engines are complete wrecks. The dead were taken to Heron siding and buried, while the wounded were cared for.

A little over a year ago Downs & Allen purchased Clark & Ulm's band of cattle on the Sun river and Teton range, and had turned over to them after last year's round-up about 5,000 head, paying for the band \$135,000 cash. A few weeks ago these gentlemen sold the cattle to a syndicate, composed mostly of Colorado capitalists, at \$30 a head all around, realizing in the transaction \$335,000 in cold cash—the increase in value and increase in the herd being them

\$100,000 in one year. This is probably the biggest cattle sale yet made by one firm in Montana, and it certainly illustrates in a very forcible way how the wealth of our cattle kings has piled up in the past year.—Benton Press.

The Butte Inter-Mountain of the 22nd says: An organization in this place, known throughout the territory as "3-7-77," last night took a man by the name of Harry Gundy out into a vacant shaft house in the edge of town and administered sixty-four lashes with a cat-tail to him, inflicting a terrible punishment and considerably lacerating his body. The cause of such extreme measures was that Grundy, on Thursday morning, made a brutal attack on a little ten-year-old girl, the daughter of a respected citizen of this place, and although failed in his villainous designs, considerably bruised and injured her. Gundy had a fair trial in the presence of the victim and other witnesses, and confessed to the crime. After chastisement he was escorted to a county road and told to perpetually absent himself on pain of severer punishment.

### NEWS NOTES.

The executive order, to go into effect the 1st of July, reduces the number of internal revenue districts from 126 to 82.

Another colored cadet, John H. Alexander, has been admitted to West Point. Wonder if he will give as much trouble as did Flipper and Whittaker?

John L. Geryker, a well known New York millionaire, was drowned at Saratoga Lake Monday while bathing. He leaves a two months bride.

A Canadian railroad is to be built from Cornwall, in Ontario, to Sault Ste. Marie, at the head of Lake Superior, where the promoters hope to connect with an extension of the Northern Pacific.

Yellow fever is making terrible havoc among the European and American residents of Vera Cruz, Mexico. Last Saturday there were ten deaths of this disease in the hospital.

The immigration commissioners are greatly exercised over the constant arrival in New York of swarms of pauper immigrants, who come to this country, mostly from Ireland, by the aid of the British government. Steps will be taken to have them sent back as paupers.

General Crook has been ordered to Washington by the Secretary of War for consultation as to the final disposition of the captured Apaches. The War Department received no official information of the arrival of the captives at San Carlos, and no instructions to send them there have been sent to General Crook.

The grand regatta on Lake Calumet, at the town of Pullman, Ill., resulted as might have been expected, in Hanlan winning the single scull race, and he and a partner, Lee, winning the double scull race. Teemer, a hitherto unknown sculler, won what was called the consolation race, (in which Hanlan did not appear), beating the best time on record for a three mile race.
