Among the arrivals at the Livingston Hotel yesterday was Craigie Sharp, jr., representing The West Shore, a handsomely illustrated and ably conducted monthly paper, or rather magazine, published by L. Samuels, Esq., at Portland, Oregon. Subscription \$2.50 per year. The West Shore has lately been devoting especial attention to Montana, both in written articles and illustrations. As soon as the artist arrives, which will be in a short time, views of the scenery around Livingston and of the principal buildings in town will be taken, and in connection with an extended description of the town and country will be produced in the columns of this excellent publication. Mr. Sharp was hardly ready to believe that the growth of Livingston was the work of little more than six months', such magical prosperity being beyond his experience. He will probably take the east-bound train to-day, going as far as Chicago before returning to the Pacific coast.

Circus Day.

Before this issue of the ENTERPRISE reaches the hands of our readers the special train bearing Dan Castello's great Nickel-plate circus will have arrived in town. To-morrow afternoon, at 2 o'clock, and also at 8 in the evening, performances will begin. Reports from the various towns where the show has already appeared, speak of it in most flattering terms. Castello has been in the circus business during the past thirty-seven years, and knows how to run a good show. He is the pioneer circus manager of western Montana, as well as of the Yellowstone valley, and has always borne the reputation of producing what he advertises. Go and see the show.

Intelligence of a frightful calamity at a place of amusement in Dervio, on the shore of Lake Como, has just been received. A performance was in progress at a theatre when the structure took fire and was entirely destroyed. Forty-seven lives were lost and twelve others were injured.

The Mississippi and Missouri rivers still continue to rise very rapidly, and on Monday the water at Kansas City and St. Louis was higher than at any time since 1881. Smaller towns along the rivers are in many instances completely inundated. The inhabitants have been forced to leave their homes and retire to higher ground, and leave their property to the mercy of the flood. Public and private property is being destroyed to a terrible extent, and it is hard to estimate what the grand total of damage may be before the waters subside.
