

The Husbandman says: "A railway from Livingston to Great Falls would pass up Shields and down Smith river valleys, would be easily constructed, inexpensive, and with only one divide, the grade of which would be very light. The route would lay through a rich country and would be the shortest and best railroad connection the manufacturing city could have from the south."

Great Falls is the latest paper town of Montana. J. J. Hill, the railroad king of the northwest, and Paris Gibson, one of the richest men of Montana, have bought the land adjoining the falls of the Missouri river, near the mouth of Sun river. Here they propose to build up the manufacturing city of Montana. The water power is one of the best and most easily utilized in the world, and as both the projectors have capital and libitum, and as Montana needs manufacturing enterprises, there seems no reason why Great Falls should not prove the Minneapolis of Montana. A railroad from Livingston to White Sulphur Springs, and down the Smith river to its mouth, would strike the Missouri but a few miles from the proposed town, and continued to Benton, would pass the townsite. We believe this is the route yet to be occupied by a railroad line to Benton from Livingston.

Board of Trade Meeting.

Mr. Babson then moved that a meeting be called for Monday evening, July 2d, to elect officers and perfect an organization. Carried.

Mr. Wetzstein tendered the use of his hall for the next meeting. Upon motion of Mr. Goughnour his offer was accepted.

Mr. Bush moved that a vote of thanks be extended to Mr. Wetzstein for his kind offer. Carried.

Mr. Babson moved that three tellers be appointed to receive votes for officers. Carried.

Chair appointed Messrs. Babson, Knight and Douglas as such committee.

Adjourned to meet at Wetzstein's Hall Monday evening, July 2d.
