Four freighting wagons were loaded last night and ready to start for the Clark's Fork mines with machinery and supplies for Major Eaton's Republic mine. This does not include the whole outfit, as a bull train of six wagons was yet to be loaded, and the heavier portion of Loth's smelter and saw-mill have been shipped up to the end of the Park branch, there to be taken by teams.

A train of nearly, if not quite, twenty wagons stands near the railway warehouse loading or waiting to receive freight for White Sulphur Springs. The larger portion of these teams brought in wool or hides, but a few made the trip as hurriedly as possible, without load. The freight includes farming machinery and merchandise of every description. Large quantities of goods for this destination have been taken from Livingston this summer, but by reason of reinforcements constantly arriving by rail, the amount on hand shows little diminution.

**The President Coming.**

It is now settled that the president will start on his contemplated trip to the Yellowstone valley about the first of August next, if nothing should interfere with his present plans. Arrangements for the trip are in the hands of Lieut-General Sherman. The party will number about ten persons, and will be gone about five or six weeks. The president will join General Sherman and other members of the party at Chicago. It is proposed to go direct to the Yellowstone Park with as few steps as possible. The president has abandoned all idea of visiting Newport and will probably remain in Washington until he starts for the west, with the possible exception of making an occasional short sea trip on the steamer Dispatch. The party will include Gen. Sheridan, Gen. Strong, Senators Davis, Vest, Logan, Cameron and Morgan, Representative Haskell, Delegate Maginnis, and other distinguished gentlemen.

**National Park Surveyors.**

By direction of the Secretary of the Interior the party under John H. Renshaw will leave Washington in a few days en route for the Yellowstone National Park to make a topographical survey of the Park. Another party, under Arnold Hague, will make a geological survey of the Park.

**Enlargement of the Round-House.**

A rumor reached our office this morning that an official dispatch had been received by the representatives of the Northern Pacific in Livingston, ordering the enlargement of the round-house here to one of forty-four stalls. Thinking that G. S. LaRue, master mechanic, would be apt to know something of such dispatch if any had been received, we sought that gentleman and learned from him that no such intelligence had come under his knowledge, though he should be among the first to hear of it. Later in the day we traced the report to its source and found its origin more substantial than are the generality of such rumors. An alleged letter from the New York offices of the Northern Pacific to a railroad official (whom we could not learn) contained the order for the enlargement. The story of this letter came from a young gentleman formerly of Livingston, but now of Helena, whose veracity cannot be doubted, and who claims to have seen the letter. Set's subject rests in its original obscurity. Mr. LaRue says the Livingston round-house is on the forty-four stall plan, and that for aught he knows, the plan may be carried out at once. Meanwhile, it is not very safe to gamble on the issue in any event.
