He has completed arrangements for introduc- ing his system of lights in and around the hotel at Mammoth Hot Springs and at the other hotels in the Park as fast as they are erected. He is somewhat embarrassed by lack of telegraphic facilities, caused by the strike, as he had intended to telegraph to St. Paul and New York to have his apparatus shipped by express. His contract demands that the lights be in operation August 15th, but he fears that he will be unable to complete the work by that date unless there is a resumption of telegraphic communication.

For the Hotel in the Park.

Among the arrivals from the east to-day were A. I. Hatch and G. H. Chatterton, of New York, who come on business con- nected with the management of the hotel at Mammoth Hot Springs. Mr. Hatch is a brother of the celebrated millionaire, Rufus Hatch, who is the financial soul of the Park Improvement Company. They were accompanied by a corps of five cooks for the new hotel. These culinary artists are of the highest standing in their trade, two of them being French cooks by birth and training, while the others are fully versed in the art of catering to a fas- tidious appetite. Mr. Hatch has also in charge a large invoice of elegant silver table-ware for use in the hotel dining rooms. Evidently the Park hotel is to be furnished and managed in every depart- ment in style second to nothing at the various pleasure resorts of the world. The Improvement company expect that the Yellowstone Park will always be visited by a large representation of the wealth and fashion of America and Europe, and pro- pose to furnish accommodations suited to the tastes of even the children of luxury. In reply to a question as to who was to have the direct management of the hotel, Mr. Hatch said it was not yet finally de- cided, but would be announced in a few days. The party took the train yesterday afternoon for the Park.

Promotion for J. W. Hathaway.

There are few who have lived long in the towns and hamlets of Montana who do not know J. W. Hathaway, deputy collector of internal revenue and deputy U. S. marshal. Of late there has been a change in the revenue district by which Helena is made the head office for Montana, Utah and Idaho, and Collector Fuller placed in charge. The collectors of Idaho and Utah, as well as of Montana, were discharged. Collector Fuller, of this territory, was placed in charge of the

head office, and those of the other two divisions offered positions again if they chose to accept the subordinate positions. He of Idaho has remained, but it is be- lieved that the collector at Salt Lake will not accept, and if so it will be given to the well known J. W. Hathaway. This will be a step in advance for Mr. Hatha- way, and one that he well deserves for his faithful services in the past.


