Park Branch.

The end of track of the Park branch is now something over thirty miles from Livingston, and a new station, Bailey's, has been established thirty and a quarter miles out on the line. A new time-table will go into effect to-day, by which trains will leave Livingston at 7 a. m. and 1:30 p. m., and arrive at 12:20 and 6:50 p. m. The progress in laying iron made on the Park branch during the past ten days has been very rapid, and it is almost safe to say faster than for the same continuous period at any time on the main line. The necessity was urgent and the contractors have responded with the utmost promptitude.

Park Prices.

The Yellowstone National Park Improvement company has submitted to the secretary of the interior the following list of prices to be charged for transportation, hotel and other accommodations in the Park, which prices, under the operation of the lease granted this company, must be approved by the secretary. The secretary approved the rates on the 17th.

The Telegraphers' Strike.

The following Chicago telegram dated the 19th will give an idea of the scene in that city when the operators left work and also of future prospects without their services:

At twelve o'clock, Washington time, the body of the army of operators in the Western Union office in this city went out on a strike. The scene in the operating room was a memorable one. There had been a feeling of nervous excitement for twenty-four hours, and it had been wrought up to a high pitch by the almost certainty that work would cease at eleven o'clock to-day. Promptly to the stroke of the clock the keys were closed and half-sent messages were left uncompleted. It is estimated to exceed one hundred operators who went out, and among the number fifteen or twenty female operators. There was nothing boisterous, and there was the familiar shaking of hands with the chief operators, who remained loyal to the company. Outside of the building and in front of the Chamber of Commerce, which stands opposite the Western Union building, a great crowd had gathered to witness the departure of the operators from the building, and there was some cheering as the head of the column of strikers made its appearance, but it soon melted away as the operators at once marched from the scene to the headquarters of the union to deliberate. When the operating room had been cleared it was found that forty operators were still at their desks, exclusive of twenty-one chief operators and officials.

The full effect of the strike cannot be stated at this writing, as there is a natural confusion (anticipated by the officials) growing out of the large exodus. But it is expected that the office will be in fair working condition by night-fall. The Wheatson system of the company is in full operation, by which all the New York business can be taken care of. Colonel Cloury has received advices to the effect that the Omaha, St. Louis and Cincinnati offices are in fair shape and will be able to work along with their reduced force. Shortly after the strikers had left the building operators from the outside began to make their appearance in the operating room and were given places.

The officials now confidently assert that with the force now at their command and with certain prospects of new men the public business can be handled without serious friction.

CAIRO, July 19.—The Egyptian government has accepted the offer of England to send twelve doctors to the infected districts and the wooden huts where the cholera originated burned. Fifty deaths were reported in Cairo in the last twelve hours. The cholera is raging in many villages not mentioned in the returns.

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

PITTSBURG, July 18.—District 8, Knights of Labor held a meeting to-night and passed resolutions tendering financial aid to the telegraphers in case of a strike.

The contract for building the penitentiary at Bismarck has been let to Megan & Kelly, of Fargo. The contract calls for its completion in a little less than a year from date. The cost will be \$52,000.

NASHVILLE, July 18.—Swain, the man who was arrested for stealing the ledger so important in the Polk trial, has confessed he took it at the instigation of ex-Treasurer Polk, also that he received \$175 for the deed.
