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Evil days have come upon Miles City and it may truly be said of her that "misfortunes come not singly." But a few months ago witnessed the beginning of a local political upheaval that brought upon the town unenviable notoriety, and involved a number of her prominent citizens in public disrepute. Hardly have the first effects of this bitter cup passed away when another social eruption begins, which if of a different order is hardly less deplorable than the first. Different strata of society seem from reports to be arrayed against each other almost as if involved in open war. Threats and counter threats are issued by the opposing sides with such confusing promptitude as to leave it in doubt as to which is in the ascendancy, or who is comprised in the separate parties. One thing is, however, certain, namely, that Miles City will come out of the present struggle either in a much better or in a much worse social condition than before the trouble. If those at the head of the triumphant party are of the right class the result will be a species of moral purification which the town has long needed; if otherwise Miles City will sink lower in the scale of inter-social felicity and will be placed a long way backward in the line of improvement. Not only is the present trouble in Miles City a most disastrous occurrence for that town, but is a detriment to every town in Montana. This territory has rightly or wrongly managed to win a reputation for possessing a class of inhabitants with whom conformity to law is the exception and open lawlessness the rule. Eastern sensation retailers seize with avidity upon any Montana news that goes to prove this record, and the late difficulties in Miles City will be circulated and commented upon where anything in our favor would not be noticed or mentioned. Montana cannot afford these frequent recurrences, which appear to evince a desperate condition of society, and the quicker they are entirely suppressed the sooner will our territory acquire a reputation as a country where life and property are safe, and where visitors may come without fear: If there are lawless elements in Montana, let them be put down quickly and with a strong hand, and then the territory will cease to be the asylum for every fugitive from justice and every drunken rowdy who is ambitious to figure as a "bold, bad man."

The Presidents Yellowstone Expedition.

CHICAGO, July 23.—A representative of the Associated Press called upon Gen. Sherman to-day to ascertain the details of the contemplated trip of the President to the Yellowstone region. The General explained that President Authur had now fully decided to undertake the journey, a decision that had only been reached within the last few days. The party will consist of Secretary Lincoln, Surrogate Rallins, of New York; Gov. John S. Crosby, of Montana; Senator Vest and Gen. Sheridan, and will start from this city August 1st on a special train tendered by the Northwestern and Union Pacific roads. Green River station, on the Union Pacific will be reached on the night of August 5th. At 7 o'clock on the morning of Aug. 6th the party will take spring wagons and drive to Atlantic City and remain there over night, and will arrive at Fort Washakie Aug. 7th. After resting at Washakie a day they will proceed on horseback, accompanied by E. M. Hayes' troop of the Fifth United States cavalry, up the valley of Wind river, across the main chain of the Rocky mountains into Teton basin, near Jackson lake, and from thence to the upper geyser basin, arriving there August 20th. After remaining three or four days in the National Park, the party will strike the Northern Pacific railroad at Livingston, where a special train tendered by the Northern Pacific and the Chicago and North-western railroads will meet them and bring them back to Chicago. The camp equipage and forty days' rations for escort and mess and equipage for the president and party will be transported from Washakie by pack mules. About twenty-five of these mules will be used for headquarters, and the remainder, comprising about 125, will be led for the supply of the escort going and returning and for the supply of the couriers, and will be dropped along the trail to keep the president in daily communication with Washington.
