Details of the Killing at Gardiner.

The Murderer Supposed to Have Met with Swift Retribution.

Robbery at the End of Track.

GARDNER, AUG., 22.—On Monday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock, George Weber and John Zuterern got in a dispute in front of Charlie's Beer Hall at this place regarding a trade they had made of some blankets and a razor in which there was a difference of about four dollars. They finally came to blows and Zuterern beat Weber over the head with a rock. The latter then drew his revolver and shot Zuterern in the left breast, causing death in about five minutes. Weber sat on a rock near by and watched his victim's movements until he died and then fled to the river, about 150 yards distant. The river at this point flows very swiftly and may be described as rapids or dalles—the descent being considerable and the channel broken by projecting rocks. No one watched Weber very closely, but it is supposed that he jumped into the stream and either was successful in reaching the opposite bank or was drowned in the rushing current. He has not since been seen and it is generally believed that he is drowned. The mounted police from the National Park have been searching the country in every direction for him but so far without avail. There are many here who believe that the killing was justifiable, though there may be evidence developed at the inquest to-day which will change this opinion.

Robbery at the End of the Park Branch.

END OF TRACK, Aug. 22.—This afternoon while W. C. Blood, a conductor on the Northern Pacific who had just returned from the Park, and Wm. Woolsey, of Livingston, were waiting for the train an unknown man entered the room and stole a valise belonging to the former and an overcoat belonging to Woolsey. The valise contained a number of railroad passes and a quantity of heavy clothing. There was a bottle of whiskey in the coat pocket and from this the thief treated a number of his friends before decamping. He fled with his small, booty and officers are now after him.

### MONTANA NEWS.

The progress made in the Bozeman tunnel last week was 77 feet.

Butte polled nearly 500 majority for the court house loan on Monday last.

A party of excursionists are about to start from Saginaw, Mich., for the Yellowstone country.

The "devil" in the Billings Herald office was caught in the press on Thursday and severely wounded.

A prairie fire raged through Clark's Fork Bottom the other day, destroying hay, crops, and fencing.

A stage driver reported six inches of snow on Tuesday on the divide west of Helena. That sounds like winter.

The Moss Minstrels who left Helena yesterday morning will be the last company to go from that town to Deer Lodge by stage.

There is a man named Cameron living in Missoula county who last Friday visited the county seat for the first time in thirteen years.

The Warm Spring Creek Mining company are reported to have struck a rich pay streak which they propose working by drifting next winter.

Semi-weekly mail service to Ennis will be discontinued and the postoffice will be included in the daily route between Virginia City and Bozeman.

The coroner's jury in the case of Jaynes, who was killed in Meagher county by L. S. Leavitt, decided that it was an instance of justifiable homicide.

Three train loads of graders and their outfits were dispatched last week from Missoula for work on the Cascade division of the Northern Pacific.

The Buffalo (Wyo.) Echo says there will probably be 10,000 live cattle shipped over the Northern Pacific railroad from that county during the season.

Marysville near Helena is passing through the dullest time ever experienced since mining commenced in that section. It had a severe snow storm on the 18th inst.

A party of Benton prospectors own a silver mine at Kicking Horse Pass just along the proposed grade of the Canadian Pacific and expect it to make them a fortune.

A timber fire northwest of Gloster has burned about 1,500 cords of wood, and unless checked soon much more will be consumed and a great deal of damage done.

Justice of the Peace Anderson, of Missoula county, will stand trial at the next term of court upon the charge of unlawfully performing a marriage ceremony for an eloping couple.

Frank Leslie depicts Arthur as he will appear on his return to Washington—clad in fringed buckskin and slouched hat, and laying with bowie-knife and six-shooter for the office seekers.

The San Francisco Examiner says: "It is believed that within the next five years the copper product of Montana and Arizona alone will be equal in value to the present output of the entire country."

The first Northern Pacific train carrying passengers at Garrison, two miles beyond the mouth of the Little Blackfoot left Helena depot at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning, Glendive time, or 6.20 Helena time.

McCammon & Cree have arrived in the Yellowstone valley from Oregon with 5,000 fat wethers which they expect to sell. They say that sheep are scarce and dear on the Pacific coast and that few are on the road coming this way.

General Albert Pike, Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors, General of the 33rd degree of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Masonry for the southern jurisdiction of the United States, is in Helena.

Major H. B. Wilkins is in receipt of a letter from Colonel Wilkins, commanding Fort Keogh, stating that the band at that post will be present at the railroad celebration. Also that the Colonel and some officers and ladies of that garrison will attend the celebration.

On the 15th of September the military telegraph lines extending between the following places will be sold at public auction at Bismarck: Glendive to Terry's Landing, 168 miles; Bismarck to Fort Buford, 528 miles; Fort Custer to Summit, Idaho, 205 miles; Fort Bennett to Fort Meade, 160 miles; Fort Yates to Fort Sully, 122 miles.

A correspondent of the St. Paul Pioneer Press predicts that within four years Montana will be turning out \$40,000,000 per year in precious metals. And probably he has now in sight to justify such a prediction, only needing labor and capital to develop it. New and rich mineral districts are constantly being discovered, and there is a vast amount of territory yet to be prospected. The mining industry of Montana is yet in its infancy, though she has produced more wealth for her age and population than any other mineral country.

"These," said Governor Crosby to Chester A. Arthur, as the presidential party entered the Territory of Montana, "These are my dominions; h—l of a country, isn't it?" The president nodded gravely and blew a cloud of cigar smoke. "That is one of my subjects," continued the Exarch of Montana, as an old-timer rode by on a wall-eyed cayuse that had left its tail somewhere, through hurry or accident. "Sweet looking pill, ain't he?" The executive of the United States mildly expected by way of answer; then, turning to the Great Mogul of Montana he remarked: "So you don't like Montana?" "No," replied the Grand Panjandnum, "I am not appreciated here." "That is sad," observed Mr. Arthur, "but now that I think of it, no one ever asked you to come out here, did they?" "No," answered the Grand Turk. And here the conversation ceased.—Benton Record.
