**The Shooting Accident at Gardiner.**

The particulars of the shooting at Gardiner, mentioned in yesterday's issue, are about as follows: Neil Lane had been at Cooke City, leaving his wife at Gardiner. During his absence some mischief-maker wrote him that his wife was receiving the attentions of another man, and Lane immediately came down, reaching Gardiner on Monday afternoon. He and his wife had an interview, at which none but they two were present, and during the time a shot was discharged, and Mrs. Lane received the bullet in her head. It did not penetrate the skull, but coursed around under the scalp and came out at the back of the head almost opposite where it had entered. Both Lane and his wife state that the shooting resulted from a pure accident. The latter especially pretexts that the shot was accidental and that it was entirely and only her fault, and that her husband should not be in any way molested. With this testimony in prospect the officers did not feel justified in making any arrest and very properly will not do so unless further developments appear. The case is a most unfortunate one, as, from the shooting being without witnesses other than the parties concerned, those who know the story may jump to the conclusions that it was a wilful act—a conclusion far from warrantable.

Some time during the day Brooks, the Connecticut man who came here to make a trip by boat down the Yellowstone, Missouri and Mississippi rivers to New Orleans, will start upon his trip. He will be accompanied by T. W. Ingersol, a young photographic artist of St. Paul, who has been in the Park during the past six weeks.
