Fienchy, a teamster at Fort Maginnis, fell from a wagon he was driving a few days ago, and the wheels passing over his head, he was instantly killed.

At Miles City on Saturday, the Eastern Montana Live Stock Association was organized. T. J. Bryan was elected president and J. W. Strevell, secretary-treasurer.

John Mitchell, working in the Collar mine at Maiden, was nearly buried by a slide in the face of the level where he was working. He was extricated and found to be seriously though not fatally hurt.

Upwards of one hundred and twenty-five residents of Dillon sent in a petition asking merchants to close their places of business during the full day on Sunday, instead of half the day, as at present.

An ore car at the Collar, got away from the night-shift last week, jumped the track and plunged into the ore house demolishing a window and falling about twenty feet, to the ground. —Maiden Argus.

The work on the Mullan tunnel is progressing finely and will probably be completed and ready for trains on November 1st. The interval between October 10th and that time will be required for perfecting the drainage of the tunnel which cannot be done until the excavation has been finished, when directly over where the track is to be laid, and in the centre of the tunnel, and at a depth of about a foot below the floor, a ditch will be dug to drain the tunnel; to facilitate which a pipe will be laid in the bottom, and the ditch then filled up with broken stone. The track will then be ballasted about a foot high above the top of the ditch. Upon this ballast the rails will be laid. The ditch and pipe covered as described will be carried about 500 feet outside of the tunnel to a sink, where the waste water will be disposed of.

A cable railroad operated by water power, is to be located on Wood River, and trains run by that method between Hailey and Ketchum. The machinery plant will be at a point midway between the two camps. The water power is plenty and to spare. The track will extend from the depot at Hailey to the Philadelphia smelters above Ketchum, the distance being 10 1/2 miles, and the speed of the wire will be such as to take a car between the two points in one hour. At present the road between the two towns is lined with teams hauling ore, coke, coal, merchandise, etc., and it is estimated that the traffic over the road by another season will be at least 400 tons per day. Work is to begin at once, and is to be pushed to as early finish as possible.
